MYMENSINGH. May 31: Bangladesh Agricultural University (BAU) was closed sine die today following clashes between the workers of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) and Chhatra League (S-A) on the campus. Students were asked to vacate the halls within 4

The University Syndicate took the decision of the closure at an emergency meeting at 12.30 pm, which was presided over by Vice-Chancellor Prof Md Asadur Rahman.

JCD and BCL (S-A) workers exchanged over a hundred rounds of gunshot and exploded cocktails for about four hours starting from 2 pm today. They chased each other till evening.

Over 100 rooms of eight halls of the university were

From Our Correspondent ransacked during the clash. Belongings of the rooms were also set ablaze.

A tense situation was prevailing on the campus following the incidents. Police and BDR have been posted in and around the campus.

When contacted, Proctor of the university Dr. Ataur Rahman said the clash originated from Isha Khan Hall on Thursday night on the issue of watching TV and VCR. The BCL workers wanted to watch VCR when the programme on the death anniversary of Ziaur Rahman was on the air. But the JCD workers opposed the BCL

Dhaka City Corporation has Tk 138cr debt

Shortage of funds is keeping the debt-ridden Dhaka City Corporation away from providing adequate amenities to its 70 lakh residents, on Friday.

In an exclusive interview with UNB, the newly-nominated Mayor of the Corporation Mirza Abbas said, "We are only providing the conservancy services, street lights and few emergency services and are not in a position to carry out other development activities for lack of funds".

A special allocation is needed to carry on the development work and normal responsibilities of the Corporation, he said.

The Corporation has a debt of Tk 138 crore for which mayors and administrators of the previous government were responsible, Abbas said, adding those mayors and administrators used the corporation as a

Depression again

A depression has formed over the south east Bay of Bengal. It is likely to intensify further and come over Bangladesh coasts.

A senior weatherman told The Daily Star on Friday, it is a normal monsoonic depression and is expected to herald the monsoon season.

Monsoonic depressions

occasionally turn into cyclones. However, as the cyclone months of April and May are over chances of the depression's intensifying into a cyclone are minimal, he

to flow over Bangladesh from the first week of June and cover the whole country by 12th or 15th of the month. This time monsoon is ex-

pected to set in as normal. The depression was stationed about 740 kilometres south west of Chittagong Port on Friday evening. Maximum sustained windspeed within 45 kilometres of the centre of the depression was about 40 kilometres per hour rising to 48 kilometres per hour in gust or squalls.

The depression is likely to intensify further and move in a northerly direction at a speed of 15 kilometres per hour, a Met Office special weather bulletin said.

Met Office has advised the maritime ports of Chittagong, Cox's Bazar and Mongla to Monsoonic currents start hoist Distant Cautionary Signal Number Two.

The Jigatala residence of Ganatantri Party leader Suranjit Sengupta came under attack by a group of unidentified persons on Thursday


The attackers numbering about 20 to 25 reportedly came after the screening of a T V programme where Suranjit made complimentary remarks to late President Ziaur Rahman.

The attackers damaged his Pajero Jeep and tried to break the front door of the house open. But failing to do so the attackers started to call him names and savaged him at the top of their voice for praising Ziaur Rahman on the TV. Suranjit Sen who is now in India for treatment in his

recorded programme on Ziaur Rahman praised him for his call for independence and said that Zia declared the independence when the nation was expecting a call from the armed forces. Suranjit's wife Dr Jaya

Sengupta told the Daily Star that failing to break the door open the attackers shouted a hail of abuse at Suranjit.

It was not until around 8:50 pm that power supply was restored and the generator switched off.
