# **CNG** conversion snails on few gas fillers

Lack of adequate CNG fuel stations has contributed to the slow progress in conversion of petrol-run vehicles into CNG-run ones for improvement of air quality and environment in the

The government has a plan to set up 120 CNG fuel stations in and around the city by 2006 but not more than six are likely this year, sources

More than 7000 CNG-run vehicles, which include cars, microbuses, pickup vans and autorickshaws are to queue up in only 11 CNG (compressed natural gas) fuel stations in the city for hours every-

Some two lakh automobiles ply the city streets now, emitting smoke containing toxicity and other substances harmful for human health,

sources in the Bangladesh Road

Transport Authority (BRTA) said. Government initiatives to improve the environment are not yielding much result due to lack of 'emergency arrangement' for setting up adequate number of CNGstations, they said.

The government had taken a Mega Dhaka Clean Fuel Project (CFP) involving \$113.5 million to set up over 120 CNG stations in and around the city, but it is progressing 'very slowly', sources in the sector

said. The project is funded by the

Asian Development Bank (ADB). The RPGCL (Rupantarita Praktritik Gas Company Limited) and the GTCL (Gas Transmission Company Limited), both concerns of the energy ministry, will set up the

RPGCL will set up 26 stations in the first phase. It will also import 300 CNG-run buses and 2000 CNG auto-rickshaws.

## Aman drive a little too late

The aman procurement drive is getting little response from growers and millers in the 16 northern districts as it started late and market prices of aman paddy and rice are higher than the government-fixed procurement prices.

The food directorate launched the drive on January with targets of procuring 70,000 tonnes of rice and 122,640 tonnes of paddy. But in the first four days of the drive till

Saturday, only 48 tonnes of rice and 62 tonnes of paddy could be procured in the 124 upazilas of the 16

The government this season is purchasing rice from the millers at a price of Tk 1280 per quintal (Tk 1075.20 per 84 kg sack) and paddy directly from the growers at Tk 840 per quintal (Tk 336 per 40 kg).

No rice could be procured in 14 districts out of the 16. Only in Natore and Thakurgaon, 39.200 tonnes

### 75pc DCC shops goes on lottery
