India must win

After losing their first match to archrivals Pakistan 0-1, defending champions India will go all out to win in their second Group A match against tournament's new entrants Afghanistan at the Bangabandhu National Stadium today.

Pakistan meanwhile appear in the day's first match against Sri Lanka with a soaring confidence after beating India for the first time in their football history.

Shell-shocked Indians will be in no mood to show the Afghans any mercy as they must have to win in order to keep their semifinal hopes

"We have to win both the matches against Afghanistan and Sri Lanka if we are to play in the last four," said Indian coach Stephen Constantine after his team's prac-

tice yesterday.

The English coach promised Indians would do anything and everything possible to come out victors against Afghanistan, who went down 1-0 to Sri Lanka on Friday

But injuries kept haunting the top ranked Indians. Two of their key players -- Subhash Chakraborty and Alvito D'Cunha -- refrained from the yesterday's training session at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium due to minor injuries.

India, who had to leave their four regular players back home including superstar Baichung Bhutia, might find it hard to field a winning combination if Chakraborty and D'Cunha miss today's match.

Understandably, Constantine declined to reveal his team for

today's match. Afghanistan, who played their first match without any practice because of their late arrival, had a session together at the Army

Stadium in Banani yesterday. Five of their Germany-based footballers arrived in the city separately and they did not even see their teammates before. Sri Lanka meanwhile are likely to

miss the service of their injured defender Nalind Nandakumara in today's match against Pakistan. The islanders practised at the

Maldives welcomed Bhutan in international football with a 6-0 drubbing at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Forward Ali Shiham notched the first hattrick of the third SAFF Championship as Maldives mauled the debutants in the Group Aopener of the eight-nation meet. Maldives took the lead in the very

second minute from a counter attack with Nizam finding the net from a Shiham pass. Lutfy doubled the margin in the eleventh minute.

Shiham then got into the demolition act scoring twice in successive minutes as Maldives went to take the lemon break with 4-0. The lanky striker first headed home a left side cross from Shah Ismail in the 24th minute and then netted his second in the next minute after being bril-

liantly fed by playmaker Ali Umar. There was no respite for Bhutan. playing their maiden international match after getting the FIFA membership in 2000, as Maldives showed no sign of slowing down.

Shiham completed his treble in the 67th minute with a left-foot placing shot from a Shah Ismail pass. Umar drove the last nail in Bhutan's coffin after receiving an accurate through from Nizam in the 80th minute

Ranked lowest (199) in the tournament, Bhutan were no match for the well-organised Maldives (ranked 152), who dominated the entire proceedings right from the word go.

Maldives take on hosts Bangladesh in their next match and Bhutan face neighbours Nepal in their next outing Monday.

Thrilling Aussie win

Australia snatched a seven-run win in a cliff-hanging one-day international against England in Hobart Saturday after the tourists squandered a magnificent opening partnership.

In a hectic finish, young allrounder Shane Watson held his nerve and helped restrict England to 264 for seven wickets from their 50 overs as they attempted to pass Australia's 271 for four wickets. Australia's total was built on an

unbeaten 101 by man of the match Damien Martyn. He was helped by Michael

Bevan's 52 and Jimmy Maher's 49 The Australian total looked

inadequate as England openers Marcus Trescothick (82) and Nick Knight (85) put on 165 runs to give England a marvellous platform. But as soon they were parted, wickets fell regularly and momen-

tum was lost as spinner Brad Hogg

took three wickets. In the final overs, captain Nasser Hussain still threatened to hit

England to victory. But medium-pacer Watson conceded only four runs while taking the wicket of Alec Stewart in

Then, in the final over, he cleanbowled Hussain for 43 to assure loss of spearhead Glenn McGrath, who left the field with a back strain after bowling seven overs for 31

There was no immediate indication of the seriousness of the condi-

"I knew if we could get a couple of wickets we could put pressure on their new batsmen and turn this thing around," said a relieved Australian captain Ricky Ponting. A crestfallen Hussain said it was

disappointing result after England's strong early chase but said England had not been outplayed and had produced some

He was, though, unhappy with his side's "sloppy" fielding, with the worst offender being Paul Collingwood who dropped two catches, one of them when Martyn

When Matthew Hayden (21) topedged an attempted pull back to Harmison, Australia were a rocky 53 for three wickets.

But the right-handed Martyn, partnered by left-hander Bevan, put the innings back on track with a 118run partnership.

They kept the scoring rate at about five an over, finding the gaps and punishing the odd loose ball. However, when left-arm spinner lan Blackwell was introduced the

scoring rate eased. Blackwell was rewarded for his accuracy when Bevan (52 from 99 balls) played the ball on to his stumps.

Maher, after a watchful start, lifted the scoring rate, his runs including four fours and a six.

India clinch a cliff-hanger Cricket

AFP, Auckland A Virender Sehwag-inspired India ended an amazing New Zealand fightback with a one-wicket victory in the sixth one-day international

here on Saturday. India, needing 200 to win, were strongly placed at 182-3 before nearly squandering the advantage given by Sehwag who cracked a robust 112 in the day-night match at Eden Park for his fifth century.

Sehwag's dismissal at 182 in the 42nd over triggered a dramatic collapse in which the tourists lost five wickets for 11 runs, including two in the 49th and last over bowled by seamer Andre Adams. India needed four to win in the

final over with three wickets in hand.

but Adams bowled Mohammad Kaif and then ran Zaheer Khan out off a wide ball to raise his team's hopes of an unbelievable win. Last-man Ashish Nehra then smashed the penultimate delivery for the winning single, much to the

New Zealand, leading 4-2, had already clinched the seven-match

Sehwag exploded with a flurry of

Sehwag put India on the right track as he added 70 for the opening wicket with skipper Saurav Ganguly (23) and 72 for the next with Rahul

New Zealand's catching also left

a lot to be desired. Sehwag was on 35 when he uppishly drove seamer Kyle Mills, but Chris Harris failed to hold a head-high catch after having got his hands to it.

Fortune continued to favour the
