N'ganj elections may go down to wire

A neck and neck fight is expected in Narayanganj Pourasabha elections to be held tomorrow, as BNP supporters have apparently got divided into two groups.

Although top leaders of the ruling party are trying to minimise the impact of the division. 'local politics' may affect the BNP vote bank.

According to sources, people of the town are divided on an 'area basis' ignoring party politics. The main railway track has divided the town into two parts and that may have a bearing on the election. There are about 127,000 voters in the municipal area.

Of them, nearly 55 per cent live in the southern part of the town. And

the BNP activists of this area are reportedly working for the AL candidate, Dr Selina Hayat Ivy. On the other hand. BNP candidate Nurul Islam Sarder is relying on the voters of the northern part of the town.

The minority voters may play a vital role in the election. There are about 46,000 Hindu voters in the town. Dr Ivy might get the support of female voters. People from different walks of life commented that Dr Ivy had a very good chance of winning if the election is free and fair. But Dr Ivy, who was out of the country for a long time, does not have many active workers.

Most of the AL leaders and activists are out of the town since the last general elections. "Dr Ivy's chances would depend on casting

of more votes," sources said.

BNP candidate Nurul Islam Sarder succeeded in winning over other candidates of his party, but could not stop the area-wise division of votes. His poll campaign was also affected by the anti-crime drive, as he was not in the town during the drive. He started campaigning after the withdrawal of the joint forces. Former Chairman Alhaz Murad Mia withdrew his candidature only two days back, which may help Nurul Islam Sarder. His chances will depend on whether he can successfully handle the internal grouping of SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

follow the guideline, he will be arrested and have to face legal action, the guideline signed by DMP SEE PAGE 11 COL 1



Opposition sees no chance of fair UP polls sans army

Opposition political parties have expressed skepticism about holding of the upcoming Union Parishad polls in a free and fair manner without army deployment.

It is "unfortunate" that the government has refused to comply with Election Commission's (EC's) request for army deployment during the polls, leaders of the parties said.

They raised questions about the 'sudden" withdrawal of army from grassroots level only two weeks ahead of the polls, scheduled for January 25-March 16.

The main opposition party Awami League, two factions of Jatiya Party, Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) and Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Inu) gave their views to The Daily Star yesterday on the much talked about issue.

The views came at a time when grassroots level government officials also echoed the Chief Election Commissioner's demand for army deployment. But the government continued to say that police, BDR, and Ansars would be able to ensure law and order during the polls.

Leaders of the parties said the government should provide all necessary support to the EC, including army deployment, for holding fair polls. AL General Secretary Abdul Jalil

said. "It is now clear that the ruling alliance wants to establish its control at grassroots level by rigging and capturing polling booths.'

It is mysterious that the government started withdrawing army at a time when EC sought their deployment for the UP polls. The polls will not be fair if the government dis SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Sari against cholera

A folded sari -- available to every woman in Bangladesh -can filter drinking water clean of the particles carrying cholera, cutting in half the number of cases of the disease, researchers reported yester-

day.
The study, published in this week's issue of the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, shows that low-tech solutions can save lives, the international team of researchers said.

"The beauty of this method is that it is simple. It is cheap, Anwar Huq of the University of Maryland, who helped lead the study, said in a telephone
