

US extends GSP facilities to 5,700 Afghan items

Almost 6,000 Afghan export products will be awarded duty-free status in United States markets under a special trade privilege, Afghanistan's Commerce Minister Sayeed Mustafa Kazimi announced Wednesday.

Some 5,700 "products manufactured and originated in Afghanistan can enter US markets directly dutyfree," Kazimi told a press confer-

ence.
The concessions, announced by

preferences (GSP), which grants duty-free treatment to specified products from more than 140 designated developing countries and

"This GSP designation marks an important step in Afghanistan's return to the world trading system," White House spokesman Ari Fleischer announced in a state-

"Increased opportunities for trade will help Afghanistan build an more prosperous future."

Afghan exports were close to disappearing over the past two decades of war and drought, Kazimi

"That was mainly due to the quantity of Afghanistan's merchandise and a lack of capability to compete in a global market on a global scale '

Kazimi predicted increased production, serious investment and economic expansion as a result of the US trade privileges.

Pak textile exports set to suffer on new US rules to a list of 20 suspect countries whose male nationals, aged 16 and Pakistani business leaders fear key over, visiting the US must comply textile exports to the United States with stringent immigration checks.

will suffer as a result of contentious new US immigration rules requiring Pakistanis to submit to rigorous checks.

"It will negatively hit our exports, especially textiles," said Haroon Rashid, vice president of the Federation of Pakistani Chambers

of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI). Pakistan was added last month

They are required to register with the Immigration and Naturalisation Service by February 16, provide fingerprints, proof of address, and undergo interviews.

Officials in Islamabad estimate that 50,000 Pakistanis living illegally in the US will be deported as a result, and are furious at Pakistan's inclusion on the list

Foreign Minister Khurshid Mahmud Kasuri has asked Washington to give Pakistan "special treatment" and delete it from the list for its key role in the US-led campaign to hunt and destroy the al-Qaeda terror network and the

Taliban leadership. Anxiety over the new measures has spread to exporters, and their fear is focussed on the all important trade in textiles, Pakistan's biggest export commodity.
