Bangladesh thrashed newcomers Bhutan 3-0 in the last match of the first round in the third South Asian Football Federation (SAFF) Championship at the floodlit Bangabandhu National yesterday.

Ariful Kabir Farhad struck twice and substitute Rokonuzzaman Kanchan added the third in the 78th minute to ensure the hosts' third straight win and the top spot of

Farhad, coming in for first-choice striker Kanchan, gave Bangladesh

The fleet-footed attacker doubled the margin nine minutes into the second half heading home a Saiful floater from the right

The third Bangladesh goal was a beautifully worked move by two second-half substitutes.

## Eradicate mosquito, Narayanganj keep city clean: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday issued directives to the authorities concerned to enhance the beauty of the capital and to eradicate the mosquito menace by keeping it always clean.

Her directives came at an interministerial coordination meeting on different development programmes under various departments in Dhaka City Corporation (DCC)

During the two-hour long meeting held at the Prime Minister's Office, the mayor of Dhaka, ministers and officials discussed the pros and cons of the existing mechanism for the cleanup of Dhaka City including its waste disposal management. and giving serious consideration to take necessary steps to enhance its

Listening to all concerned on a host of development issues, Khaleda Zia directed the DCC to clean the city without wasting time to lessen the sufferings of city-

The prime minister suggested establishing four dumping grounds in four corners of the burgeoning city for its garbage disposal instead of disposing the waste at different She called for the use of both

machine and manual methods for cleaning the city and checking the mosquito menace

Khaleda Zia suggested reviving the earlier timing of disposing garbage from 12 midnight to 8 in the morning, ensuring proper management of garbage disposal boxes at different points, erasing wall writ

## Filling stations make windfall in spurious fuel

Filling stations in the city are selling adulterated petrol and octane as the prices of the fuels have been increased, alleged many car owners and drivers yesterday.

The filling stations are mixing kerosene with petrol and octane for undue profits, cashing in on a government order for price hike of fuels except kerosene, they said. On January 5, the government

increased the prices of octane, petrol and diesel to Tk 35, Tk 33 and Tk 20 up from Tk 30, Tk 28 and Tk 17 a litre, but the price of kerosene remained unchanged at Tk 17 a

Over the last few days, the northern region of the country has been facing artificial scarcity of kerosene, according to newspaper

Meanwhile, the Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) issued a letter to the deputy commissioner of each district to take initiatives to control the adulteration. Abul Kashem, a driver of the

Gabtali-Gulistan minibus service,

has said the engine acts up if the vehicle runs on adulterated fuel. Munir Hossain, a car owner aired the same allegation without mentioning any filling station that

sells adulterated fuel. The Bangladesh Standard and Testing Institute (BSTI) started collecting samples from different filling stations in the capital for test, said Lutfar Rahman Khan, a BSTI

On Tuesday, a BSTI press release said it collected 12 samples of octane, petrol and diesel from four filling stations in Narayanganj

Now, the difference in price between kerosene and octane is one lakh 59 thousand 120 taka kerosene and petrol one lakh 41 thousand 480 taka and kerosene and diesel 26 thousand 10 taka a tank (nine thousand litres).

The BPC is planning to mix chemical dye with petroleum to control sales of the adulterated fuel and now checking whether it is However, Abdur Rahman, presi-

dent of the filling stations association, and Mohammad Nazmul, organising secretary, could not be reached for comments yesterday.

## 18 fall sick due fume from faulty

Seventeen students and a teacher fell sick from suffocation caused by fume from a faulty generator at the Daffodil Institute of Information and Technology (DIIT) at Kalabagan in

The incident took place when 31 first-year students of the institute sat for examinations in two rooms on the fifth-floor of a six-storey building. At about 12 noon, the students

The injured were taken to Samrita Hospital and later shifted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

Latifur Rahman, on-duty doctor at the DMCH, said the students are out of danger and would be released SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

# Doors shut on the war-wounded

The Muktijoddha Kalyan Trust Hospital in the city has remained closed for the past five years while most war-wounded freedom fighters lack proper medical facilities

The hospital at Mirpur was established on December 16, 1979 with the intention to provide medical facilities to war-wounded freedom fighters and their families. It began operation in 1981 under the supervision of Muktijoddha Complex Fund Committee and continued till 1993. The trust had leased out the hospital for 10 years

to the 'Muslim Ummah Corporation,' a nongovernment organisation, on January 15, 1994. However, the agreement was cancelled four years later after the corporation failed to pay the Muktijoddha Kalyan Trust as agreed. The trust got hold of the hospital again on December 29, 1998 and

The government employs a team of 10 ansars and

two officers to guard the hospital with all its valuable equipment. This arrangement costs the government Tk 77.000 per month.

However, the guards suffer various inconve-

"It is hard for us to look after the huge hospital area with such a small manpower," said the ansars incharge. Moreover, there has been no supply of water for the past one year. "We have to fetch water in buckets from other places," noted ansar Mobarak. He also mentioned that gas connection was severed eight months ago.

At least 273 of the 3,200 war-wounded freedom fighters who needed treatment for one reason or another across the country have died. Most of them died because of lack of proper medical facilities, said

## Time for anti-AIDS steps: Nafis Sadik

Dr Nafis Sadik, special envoy of the UN secretary-general, said Bangladesh needs timely investment in preventive measures to maintain low HIV and AIDS preva-

She was speaking at a press conference yesterday in the city.

She noted that despite low prevalence of HIV /AIDS, less than one per cent among sex workers, Bangladesh is a high-risk country

The population age structure is extremely vulnerable to HIV, she said. There are thirty million people below the age of twenty years, and there is evidence that young people are experimenting with commercial sex and multiple partners. Yet, it is generally believed that only a few segments of the population are at risk of HIV, she added.

Moreover, the low level of knowledge of the general population

# Rajuk walks away with **Gulshan walkway**

Once again Rajuk has taken up a walkway project in Gulshan, deviating from its own plan to demarcate properly and develop the Gulshan-Banani-Baridhara Lake.

In the past, Rajuk filled up part of the lake along its banks for building walkways but 'secretly allocated' residential plots created this way to politically-backed influential individuals. Rows after rows of plots were created and roads built in the lake area over the last 20 years on vari-

Rajuk on June 20 last year to take steps to demarcate the lake and develop the lake area. But other than taking up a project for building walkways, Rajuk has 'virtually done nothing' in this regard so far. A Raiuk official admitted the

walkway project is 'unplanned'. It is an "isolated venture, a highly motivated one with bad intentions. In 2000, Rajuk had undertaken a

Tk 120 crore lake development project, which envisaged saving the lake from encroachments and pollution and development of its

banks with various amenities. A consultant was also engaged. But internal feud over the 'share' of such a big project eventually threw it into uncertainty. In a letter dated December 26 last year, Rajuk cancelled its contract with the consultant, saying the process of engaging a new consultant would begin soon, sources said. "It is not understandable why

Rajuk should take up a walkway project when an integrated project is in the offing," said a top official in the Ministry of Housing and Public **SEE PAGE 11 COL 3**
