US customs to tighten cargo entry rules from February

New anti-terrorism measure may result in higher costs, slowdown in traffic

The US Customs Service will start said. imposing penalties next month on violators of a new anti-terrorism measure requiring advance manifests of cargos shipped to US ports, its deputy chief said here Wednesday

Douglas Browning, the deputy commissioner of the US Customs Service, warned the government will not tolerate any violations after the end of a 60-day grace period on Febrary 1 for the 24-Hour Advanced Manifest Rule.

"The consequences of a terrorist incident using a container would be profound." he told a conference on maritime security. If a weapon of mass destruction

concealed in a container box was detonated at a US port, "the impact on trade and the world economy will be immediate and devastating," he said.

The US and other countries will stop unloading containers, resulting in a massive pile-up and "the net

US ports and waterways handle more than two billion tonnes of domestic and foreign commerce annually, according to the US Coast Guard.

The advance notice rule, designed to prevent terrorists from using container boxes to smuggle weapons of mass destruction, went into effect in December but the US Customs Service gave a 60-day grace period during which there will be no penalties

Incorrect or incomplete manifests can trigger a penalty of "liquidated damages" equivalent to 5,000 US dollars per violation.

International donors on Wednesday promised Indonesia 2.7 billion dollars in loans this year to help it meet its budget deficit but urged Jakarta to redouble reform efforts to attract flagging investment.

The agreement came on the second and final day of a meeting of the Consultative Group on Indonesia (CGI), which groups 21 bilateral donors and seven multilateral agencies.

The CGI members, meeting in Bali some three months after a terrorist bombing there killed more than 190 people, praised Jakarta's strong response to the attack.

But donors pressed it to be equally firm in reforming its weak and sometimes corrupt judicial sector, seen as the key to reforms in pledge should help to rebuild confiall other areas of development. "They noted that the continuing
