

World number one Serena Williams ioined the pantheon of tennis legends after recording a fourth straight Grand Slam victory over big sister Venus to win the Australian Open crown here Saturday.

Williams punished her elder sibling's mis-firing service game with a series of brutal forehand winners to become only the fifth woman to hold all four Grand Slam titles at the same time

The 7-6 (7/4), 3-6, 6-4 triumph put the 21-year-old into an exclusive club, Williams joining greats Maureen Connolly, Margaret Court, Martina Navratilova and Steffi Graf as the only women to have achieved the feat. Graf was the last woman to have

held all four titles at the same time when she won the Australian Open

Williams choked back tears when presented with her trophy, and later said she was honoured to add

her name to the list of women to win all four Grand Slam titles.

"I can't believe that I can be compared to these women, to be in their category is really amazing," Williams said after the final, which was played with the roof of the Rod Laver Arena closed as Melbourne sweltered in 44-degree temperatures, the second hottest day in the city's history.

"It definitely feels really special to even be mentioned with Maureen Connolly. I've always looked at her story, that's just super special. "Really only a handful of people

have done it. I guess it's a really special feeling. Serena is now one-quarter of the

way to becoming only the fourth player to win a calendar year Grand "I'm definitely going to try to win
