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Europe split over US war plans for Iraq

Russia sees strike end-Feb, Washington ready to arrange Saddam's exile

Eight European nations yesterday threw their support behind US war plans for Iraq, giving Washington the boost it seeks from Europe for a campaign to disarm Saddam Hussein's regime in Baghdad.

Also yesterday, a high-ranking Russian military source told the Interfax news agency that Russia expected the United States to attack Irag in the last week of February.

Meanwhile on Wednesday, the US said for the first time that it was willing to help arrange exile for

British Prime Minister Tony Blair and his Spanish counterpart Jose Maria Aznar led eight leaders in signing an open letter published in

newspapers across the continent, calling for action against Saddam.

'We must remain united in insisting that his regime is disarmed. The solidarity, cohesion and determination of the international community are our best hope of achieving this peacefully," they said.

The real bond between the United States and Europe is the values we share... Our strength lies in unity," said the letter, signed by Blair, Aznar and the heads of Italy, Portugal, Hungary, Poland,

Denmark and the Czech Republic. Officials, however, downplayed talk of a rift while launching a flurry of shuttle diplomacy.

US Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, who stirred anger last

week by dismissing France and Germany as the "old Europe", on Wednesday again insisted that Paris and Berlin did not speak for the whole of the continent.

In Berlin, officials insisted it was 'plain wrong" to describe the Germans as isolated.

But in Greece, which has joined France and Germany in criticising the war plans of US President George W Bush, a foreign ministry spokesman said the Greek EU presidency had not even been nformed in advance about the

"We were not informed of this issue. We were not invited to sign that letter," the spokesman said.

Bangladesh misses out on global container business

The country's shipping services both in the public and private sectors are being gradually knocked out of global shipping with the container carrying services expanding.

Operation of local ships is now virtually limited to a few sea routes in the region as the country could not go for large-scale container service due to lack of 'mother vessels.' sources said. As a result, shipment of local

export and import cargo by ships of the public sector Bangladesh Shipping Corporation (BSC) and those of local shipping companies have greatly declined over the

over two-billion-dollar annual shipping business in the country is now about 18 per cent. Their share was around 30 per cent a few years ago.

The main line operators (MLOs) of foreign countries, which operate mother vessels, are now controlling the sea transport business in Bngladesh," one source said. In the past, Bangladeshi ships

used to go to various destinations of the world with export-import cargo in 'break bulk manner' (not in containers). But emergence of container service has almost put it to an end.

Exporters and importers now assign the MLOs to transport their cargo from one country to another. The ship owners get around 15 per cent of the nearly 15 billion dollar annual export-import of the country.

The MLOs give sub-contract to feeder vessel operators for loading and unloading goods from deep sea ports in Singapore, Malaysia and Sri Lanka, where the mother vessels anchor. So, all the 23 ocean going Bangladeshi ships 13 of the BSC and 10 of local companies -- now operate as feeder vessels, sources

Of the 13 BSC ships, only three are container carriers. However, the 10 private company ships now carry contanier-cargo.

Asked about the dominance of foreign companies in the shipping sector, shipping minister Akbar Hossain said this is because Bandladesh does not have any mother vessel and it cannot afford to buy such costly ships. Only a few

rich countries have such vessels, he

Sources mentioned that feeder service business is dominated by a Singapore-based powerful syndicate -- Chittagong Feeder Trade Committee (CFTC)-- comprising five major feeder vessel operators Bangladeshi ships now get less than 20 per cent of feeder service business. These operate in Chittagong - Singapore, Chittagong-Colombo and Cittagong-Malaysia routes. The

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Airport road to have 8 lanes

PM okays Tk 25cr scheme

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday approved a Tk 25-crore project to transform the Airport-Mohakhali highway into an eight-lane boulevard for smooth vehicular movement from the international airport into downtown Dhaka.

Besides, there would be two service lanes on both sides of the boule vard for bus-stops.

The prime minister approved the Zia International Airport Road Improvement Project while chairing a review meeting on the activities of Communications Ministry at the ICC of PMO complex and directed the authorities to complete the project in a year.

Another similar project to expand and improve the Mohakhali-Bangabhaban road under the Dhaka Urban Transport Project (DUTP) will follow, the meeting decided.

The project will also involve construction of more foot-over bridges across the highway at Airport, Nikunjo, Banani and other points

The MiG-29 Purchase Scam Case against former prime minister Sheikh Hasina and six others was sent to the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court, Dhaka, yesterday

The Bureau of Anti-Corruption (BAC) on Wednesday submitted a charge sheet against Sheikh Hasina and six others to the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court, Dhaka.

In the case filed with Tejgaon police station on December 11, 2001, it was alleged that Sheikh Hasina along with some top defence officials caused the public exchequer count Tk 700 crore (\$123 million) in loss in the purchase of eight MiG-29 fighter jets.

Bangla-Myanmar shipping begins

Service to save cost, time

A shipping service began yesterday between Bangladesh and Myanmar, marking the first legal sea vessel between the neighbours since a 1988 coup in Yangon. The Singapore-flagged con-

tainer ship left Bangladesh's main port at Chittagong for a two-day journey to Yangon. "The launching of this service would reduce cost and save time,"

said Nelum Attanayake of Orient Express Lines, the ship's owners. Earlier, most sea trade between the neighbours was routed via

Singapore, a 10-day journey, said Ahsanul Huq Chowdhury, Orient Express Lines' local representative. The step comes a month after Myanmar Senior General Than Shwe came to Bangladesh, becom-

ing the first leader of the Yangon
