Local ship owners see no bar to preferential treatment

The local ship owners do not see any obstacle to getting preferential treatment in loading and unloading goods as per Bangladesh Flag Vessel (protection) Ordinance

The observation came following the end of a stay order canceling the general waiver to the foreign ships last Friday.

"The sector can bring more foreign currency than the garment sector does," said Bangladesh Ocean Going Ship Owners Association (BOGSOA) President Syeed Hossain Chowdhury.

He said the local ships would get necessary protection if Bangladesh

Flag Vessel (protection) Ordinance 1982 is enforced strictly. The ordinance speaks of preference to Bangladeshi ships in loading and unloading cargoes.

Sources say that the ordinance remained ineffective for long due to lack of adequate number of local ships and a legal battle between the government and local ship owners.

Sayeed Hossain claimed that the existing local shipping services are fully capable of carrying all the containers necessary for executing export-import business to and from

He said there are three major local shipping services having container vessels and many others are planning to enter the business.

Under the ordinance, a foreign ship has to take permission from the Department of Shipping before loading and unloading goods at the Bangladesh ports.

The Department gives permission through a waiver certificate declaring that there was no local ship available for the job.

The government, particularly the department of shipping, observes that the ordinance should not continue because it would hamper export-import business. The Department however

Protesting the move, local ship owners filed a case with the High Court. The court passed an order in

favour of the local ship owners. But the Department went to the Appellate Division and had the order stayed till January 31, 2003

As the local ship owners accuses the Department of working in the interest of the foreign ship owners. the Department officials say fullenforcement of the ordinance would hamper over all trade of the country and disturb shipping businesses.

"There could be some advantages to the local ship owners but that has to be settled amicably through negotiation with foreign ship owners," said a high official at the Department of Shipping.

S'pore, India plan talks on free-trade pact

India and Singapore are likely to start formal talks on a comprehensive free-trade agreement within the next few months, visiting Indian Deputy Prime Minister Lal Krishna Advani said yesterday.

The matter will be taken up at the highest level in New Delhi in April when Prime Minister Goh Chok Tong visits India at the invitation of Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee, he told The Straits Times in an exclusive interview.

"India appreciates what Singapore has done to strengthen bilateral ties and to promote our relations with Asean nations," said Advani, who is also Home Minister.

A journalist in his younger days, the 75-year-old Indian leader is in town on a four-day visit at the invitation of Deputy Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong. Advani said his country would

like the proposal for a free-trade zone between the two countries "to be expedited" to further cement bilateral relations.

A joint study group of senior Singapore and Indian officials is now looking into the feasibility of the two countries entering into a comprehensive economic cooperation

The officials will be holding their next meeting in Singapore later this month, and hopefully their final meeting in India next month.

organised the workshop. Exporters at the workshop said HACCP is a system to overcome probable hazards of frozen food products from the production stage up to the destinations. The implementation of HACCP is

not sufficient enough to maintain the quality and attract importers. There should be adequate measures for ensuring hygienic atmosphere through development of fish landing centres and drains and sanitation system around the processing factory, they added.

Speakers also sought cooperation from the government and other concerned bodies to help upgrade the safety standards of frozen

Addressing the workshop Md Akhter Ali, former principal scientific officer (PSO) of the Directorate of Fisheries (DoF), discussed the stringent measures taken up by the government for effective implementation of HACCP system in the last couple of years.

The measures include amendment of fish and fish products inspection and quality control rules. training for quality control officers and microbiologists of the fish processing establishments,

strengthening field level aquaculture monitoring and ensuring quality of the raw materials, he

SMEs to get free info from GTN

Global Trade and Technology Network (GTN), a USAID funded programme, will provide necessary business related information to Bangladeshi small and medium enterprises (SMEs) free of cost.

This was announced at a press conference held at the National Press Club vesterday.

GTN Country Director M Saidul Haq and Bangladesh Programme Co-ordinator Kazi Shahed Hasan Ferdous were present at the press

Kazi Shahed Hasan Ferdous said, "Most SMEs of the country do not have the information of how to purchase cost-effective technologies and raw materials for their production. They also lack proper marketing knowledge of their products. Many of them even do not know where they can export their products profitably.'

He said GTN will help those

Registered firms may enter at www.usgtn.com to get necessary information.

facilities

"Anyone who has problems using Internet might come to our office at new Eskaton road in the city and we will extend all kind of support to them," said Shahed

GTN will also recommend local banks, which provide facilities for SMEs, to finance its registered enterprises. "If necessary, they will also help the local entrepreneurs to execute the total business process," he said.

After getting the registration order from an entrepreneur, GTN staff in Bangladesh will make an inquiry in that applicant company to ensure the programme's quality and then send the registration in its Washington office

Survey Research Group Bangladesh (srgb), a research and consulting firm will run the programme in the country.

GTN, a Washington based programme, started its operation from October 2002 in the country. The formal inauguration of the programme will be held tomorrow at Federation of Chamber of Commerce and Industries (FBCCI) auditorium.

Commerce Minister Amir Khasru Mahmud Chowdhury, US Ambassador Mary Ann Peters and FBCCI President Youssuf Abdullah Harun will be present at the inaugu-

ral ceremony. Started in 1994, GTN has already expanded its services in 40 countries throughout the world. At present, 7,238 enterprises-- 50 per cent US companies-- are the members of GTN.
