





bilateral and regional issues, according to sources in the foreign ministry. Khan will also meet with other


Indian leaders on February 15 and return home the next day. "We'll discuss bilateral and regional issues and the Middle East

And even though most of the local newspapers are devoting pages to the home team, yet Bangladesh captain Khaled Mashud believed his side would make an even bigger impact in the competition.



provincial team known as 'Dolphins was all the more surprising since pre-tournament favourites India lost to them the following day. The 27-year-old wicketkeeper

thought that the two-week conditioning camp in Namibia had helped tremendously to build up the players' confidence.

Mashud, who before leaving for South Africa dropped a bombshell by saying he intended to guit after World Cup, now believed that things had changed for the good.
