World must be ready to use force to disarm Iraq

US Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld yesterday said the world must be "prepared to use force if necessary" to disarm Iraq and that any delay would send a signal of uncertainty to Baghdad.

"We all hope for a peaceful resolution," Rumsfeld said at a highlevel security conference here. "But the one chance for a peaceful resolution is to make clear that free nations are prepared to use force if necessary -- that the world is united and ready to act.'

He said there were "a growing number of countries that are willing to participate in a coalition of the willing," both to disarm Iraq by force if necessary and to help rebuild Iraq after any conflict.

"There are those who counsel that we should delay preparations for war. Ironically, that approach could well make war more likely, not less -- because delaying preparations sends a signal of uncertainty, instead of a signal of unity and resolve.

Rumsfeld said previous sanctions against Iraq had not prevented Iraqi President Saddam Hussein from acquiring weapons of mass

"He has not been contained. He has successfully gotten into that country darn near everything he

Rumsfeld left the possibility for a peaceful resolution to the Iraq crisis if Saddam left the country.

"I would dearly love to see him get up and leave the country with his family and a few close friends. Very Rumsfeld said to applause from the audience of top-level defense decision-makers and

Sanctions have not stopped the alleged proliferation of weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, Rumsfeld said. They "haven't stopped it. The borders are porous, it's still going on, their programs are maturing every day.

"Why Iraq? It seems to me that everything else has been tried. It's been 10 or 12 years. Diplomacy has been exhausted almost."

Rumsfeld brushed off suggestions that the United States was pressing for military strikes in Irag in order to get control over the country's oil wealth.

The United States has no interest in asserting its power over countries in terms of taking their land... governments that think that way will ultimately be rejected by their people."

Rumsfeld blasted the NATO countries that were blocking the alliance from preparations to help defend Turkey in the event of war on

"It's beyond comprehension to me," he said

Three European countries -Germany, France and Belgium -are blocking a NATO accord to help defend Turkey in the event of an Iraq war, prompting NATO chief George Robertson to invoke a so-called "silence procedure" under which a package of measures will be agreed Monday if no state speaks out

Meanwhile, the fate of Iraq was hanging in the balance Saturday as UN chief weapons inspectors began a new mission here that could spell the difference between war and peace in the face of US threats to invade and occupy the country.

Hans Blix and Mohamed

ElBaradei arrived in Baghad shortly after noon from their rear base in Cyprus and were to start official talks at the foreign ministry at 4:00 pm (1300 GMT), the information ministry said.

Their arrival coincided with the 40th anniversary of a coup that brought the Baath Party of President Saddam Hussein to power in 1963.

But Blix earlier told CNN he expected "cooperation on substance" from Iraqi officials, saying they must come forward with any illegal weapons or present an "adequate explanation" for those that might already have been destroyed.
