France, Belgium veto US request for NATO help

Iraq plays oil card to stave off attack

France yesterday led European resistance to US war plans for Iraq, plunging NATO into an unprecedented crisis and initiating debate at the UN Security Council on an alternative to early military action.

The moves, backed by France's allies Belgium and Germany, have incurred the fury of the United States, which called them "inexcusable" and a threat to the future of both international bodies

They followed the departure from Baghdad vesterday of UN inspection chiefs Hans Blix and Mohamed ElBaradei after weekend talks in which they said they saw "good progress" from Iraq in cooperating ment passed unanimously last

Iraq sought to further stave off the threat of a US-led war by asking the inspectors to underline its "positive cooperation" to Security Council members, and reportedly promising to let US and British companies into its oil market if conflict was avoided.

France and Belgium, backed by Germany, used their NATO veto to block a US request for the alliance to begin military planning and deployment for an imminent war and invasion to remove Iraqi President Saddam Hussein

The three countries maintain that such preparations would send "the wrong signal" as long as diplomatic

The 19-member organisation

mmediately went into emergency sessions after Turkey tried to break the deadlock by invoking an article in NATO's founding treaty that calls on the allies to convene whenever a member state feels its territory is

US ambassador to NATO Nicholas Burns said it was a "most unfortunate" decision. "Because of this action NATO is now facing a crisis of credibility," he told report-

The United States views Turkey -NATO's only member to border Iraq -- as a key part of its invasion plans and has relentlessly pressured Ankara for permission to

deploy tens of thousands of US troops in the southwest of the coun-

"This is undoubtedly a difficult situation," NATO Secretary General George Robertson told reporters adding: "I'm confident we'll reach agreement but I can't say when it will

At the same time, the UN Security Council was debating a proposal put forward by French Foreign Minister Dominique de Villepin last week for the number of UN inspectors in Iraq to be tripled to around 300, according to a spokesman for the German government, which holds the council's chair this

Shishu hospital yet to catch test cheats

STAR REPORT

The Dhaka Shishu Hospital (DSH) has not yet taken action for alleged cheating in admission test at the Bangladesh Institute of Child Health

Question papers were reportedly leaked before the admission test for Master's in Medicine (MD) course held in November last.

Sources said a three-member probe body suggested action against those responsible in its report to the chairman of the DSH management board.

About 200 students appeared at the test. Out of 300 marks, nine candidates got between 200 and 250 and some others even got close to 300. But in last 15 years, the highest marks obtained in the test were around 180.

After the results were published a number of teachers challenged those, saving it is not possible to score such high marks.

The BICH academic council at

an emergency meeting on November 27, 2002 unanimously recommended cancellation of the test results

Some of the sources said the probe report might have suggested holding of the admission test again but express skepticism about it because of "strong political influ-

Dewan Salauddin MP, Chairman of the Management Board, said "I have the report in my hand and may soon recommend actions, which may include removal of the director of academy of BICH

Regarding possible cancellation of the test results, he said, "We don't have solid evidence of cheating. Until we have proof we cannot suggest cancellation. But I smell there is something wrong.

He however declined to give details of the report.

Indian pirates kidnap 50 fishermen

Fifty Bangladeshi fishermen were abducted on Sunday allegedly by Indian pirates from Dighimari river in the Sundarbans.

The abductors have kept the fishermen hostage at Pashurtala near the Indian border and demanded a ransom of Tk 10 lakh,

The pirates have also warned that if they do not get the money by Thursday the fishermen will face 'a dire consequence'. They released Golam Hossain of village Atulia in Shyamnagar upazila and the owner of the trawler by which the fisher-men went to catch fish.

Police said the fishermen went to the Sundarbans on Saturday night

taking permission from the Forest Department. They reached Dengimari river on Sunday morning, Indian pirates attacked them.

The fishermen who were abducted are from Atulia, Kashimari, Noabeki and Padma Pukur villages of Shyamnagar upazila. Identity of two of the abductees has so far been known. They are Rafikul Islam, 28 and Abdus Samad, 25, sons of Abdur Rahim of Atulia vil-

Fourteen fishermen were also kidnapped from Hogladanga Kunchi area in the Sundarbans on Saturday by the Indian Pirates. They are yet to

Move to replace cabinet secy 'deepens' discontent

'Discontent' in the civil administration has 'deepened' following a move to replace the cabinet secretary for his 'neutrality', highly placed

The move initiated by a section of 'junior but influential' officials, most of them posted at the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), is now being backed by some top bureaucrats. Those officials proposed that a temporary post of 'principal planning secretary' be created for incumbent Cabinet Secretary Dr Saadat Husain and that Health Secretary Fazlur Rahman be made cabinet secretary, the sources said. Saadat was made Cabinet

Secretary on May 6 last year and he is due to go on leave preparatory to retirement (LPR) on November 23 this year. Fazlur Rahman is scheduled to go on LPR in less than two weeks (on February 22). Sources at the PMO and the

Secretariat said the move to replace the cabinet secretary just because of his 'neutrality' would set a 'bad example' and lead to 'further rancor in the civil administration. The 'influential' junior officials

have initiated the move as the Superior Selection Board (SSB) headed by the cabinet secretary has not included them in the list recommended by it for promotion to the posts of deputy secretary. The SSB recommended promo
