Mob stones textiles minister's car

Gunmen shot dead the vicepresident of the Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BKMEA), Sabbir Alam Khondokar, in front of his Masdair residence yesterday

The killers ambushed Sabbir,38, younger brother of the Bangladesh

Road Transport Corporation (BRTC) Chairman and BNP leader Taimur Alam Khondokar, when he was returning home after jogging. They sprayed 21 bullets on him, leaving him instantly dead.

Angry BNP supporters took to the streets following the murder and damaged four buses.
