Euro parliament team blasts indemnity law

A European Parliament delegation the government criticised the resovesterday expressed serious conlution, various quarters approved of cern at the recent custodial deaths in Bangladesh and the subsequent passage of a bill indemnifying the ioint forces for their actions during a countrywide anti-crime drive.

"We have serious reservations about the indemnity. Nowhere in the world, forget about the western countries, can deaths in custody be tolerated," British parliamentarian Robert JE Evans, a member of the visiting European Parliamentary Delegation for Relations with South Asia and SAARC, told journalists. He made the observation after a

meeting with the Leader of the Opposition in parliament and Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina at her office in the Sangsad Bhaban.

Evans said they do not understand why the government went for the indemnification.

Expressing concerns also at the alleged persecution of the minority community, the seven-member European parliamentary delegation felt that there should be independent probes into these incidents. It also stressed setting up of an independent human rights commission

in Bangladesh. Led by First Vice Chairman Thomas Mann of Germany, the delegation is scheduled to meet Leader of the House and Prime Minister Khaleda Zia today. It is also scheduled to hold a news confer-

ence in the city later on the day. The other members of the dele-
