

Police believe self-exiled mob boss Dawood Ibrahim, who tops India's most wanted list, is the biggest player in the Indian bettingracket. The big bookies monitor compet-

itors' phone lines, foreign weather and become experts on the nature of the pitch, police say.

"I bet on if rain will stop play, if Sachin (Tendulkar) will make 50 or 100. The high in India is on these roving odds," said Ravi Tripathi, who also likes to put money down on

"The big punters just have an open line with the bookie that stays open right through the match. The odds keep fluctuating they change with every ball," said Tripathi, who refused to disclose his profession or the money he raked in during the
