Daniela Hantuchova opened defence of her biggest career triumph on Friday with a 6-2, 6-3 victory over Petra Mandula in the second round of the Pacific Life Open WTA Tour tier I tennis tour-

The third-seeded Hantuchova won her lone career title here last year, defeating Justine Henin in the fourth round and former world No. Martina Hingis in the final to become the lowest seed in history to win a Tier I event.

"I felt a lot of pressure before the first match, so I was glad to get through it without any problems today," said Hantuchova, who received a first-round bye as a seeded player. "As soon as I stepped onto the court it reminded Fellow Brazilians Paulo Cesar and Aloisio were said to have rushed over to me so much of last year." During the ensuing melee, further punches are believed to have been

The 19-year-old Slovakian has not won another tournament, but reached her third straight Grand Slam quarter-final at the Australian Open in January. She has advanced to at least the quarterfinals in all four WTA Tour tournaments she has played this year, including a semifinal showing last month at Antwerp.

Hantuchova next meets Slovenia's Katarina Srebotnik, who defeated Belgian Els Callens 6-4, 6-

Top seed Kim Clijsters of Belgium held off Fabiola Zuluaga, 6-3, 7-5. Clijsters, a finalist here in

2001, won the final four games of the match to record her second win in as many meetings with the

"The whole match she served really well but it's at those moments (serving for the set) that you get nervous," the Belgian said. "If she plays that game too well then there may be nothing you can do, but I tried to not give her a lead in that game and to keep the pressure on.

"They (lower ranked players) aren't used to being in those situa-tions," Clijsters added. "It's definitely moments like that that you have to believe in yourself."

Clijsters lost in the second round to Nathalie Dechy here last ear after a bye.

"There are so many other tournaments during the year that I never think about what I did the year before when I come back to a tournament," she said. "But I love to play here and it's nice to be back. Last year I had a shoulder injury and I was just happy to play.

Clijsters opened the season by taking the title at Sydney. She had won 23 of her last 24 matches dating to last year before a disappointing semi-final loss to eventual champion Serena Williams at the Australian Open. But the 19-year-old rebounded by reaching the final at her last two events.

Last week, Clijsters lost the Scottsdale final to doubles partner Ai Sugiyama.

No. 6 Jelena Dokic of Yugoslavia became the highest seed to lose after falling, 6-1, 5-7, 6-3, to world No. 87 Barbara Ritter of Germany.

Dokic, a winner of five titles, is yet to reach a semi-final in five tournament appearances this year. But she is hoping the results will come after starting to work with Heinz Gunthardt, the former coach of Steffi Graf.

"He's much tougher than other coaches I've worked with," said. "He knows exactly what we need to work on."

Eighth seed Chanda Rubin eased past French qualifier Marion Bartoli, 6-4, 6-3, to notch her 15th

victory in 21 matches at this event. Rubin reached the semifinals here in 1999 and the quarter-finals on three other occasions, but

missed last year's event after undergoing knee surgery. "Last year I was sitting out at this time of the year, doing rehab and watching it on TV," she said. "I feel fortunate to be healthy now and that the tennis can take care of

In other results among the top 16 seeds, No. 10 Magdalena Maleeva of Bulgaria outlasted Stephanie Cohen-Aloro of France 6-3, 2-6, 7-6 (7/1), Zimbabwe's Cara Black handed No. 11 Anna Pistolesi of Israel her fourth straight defeat, 7-6 (7/3), 6-3, No. 15 Dechy thrashed Russia's Evgenia Koulikovskaya, 6-2, 6-1, and No. 16 Amanda Coetzer of South African routed Klara Koukalova of the Czech Republic 6-

American tennis star Pete Sampras has withdrawn from the ATP Masters Series hardcourt event here, raising further questions over his future.

The 31-year-old American has not played on the men's tennis tour since his stunning victory over Andre Agassi at the US Open in

Sampras' tennis career has remained in limbo after earlier withdrawals from tournaments in San Jose and Scottsdale. Following his US Open win, Sampras

expressed a desire to come back. Sampras has been working out with his coach Paul Annacone but his brother, Gus Sampras, said Pete

wants to make sure he is both physically and mentally ready to esume his career.

"Physically, he's ready to play," said Gus Sampras, who is the tournament director at an ATP event in Scottsdale this week. "The last thing he wants to do is retire and then un-retire. He doesn't want to rush things.'

Gus Sampras said it would be unlikely that his brother would decide anything major for another

The next chance for Sampras to return would be the Masters Series event later this month in Florida.

Germany's Tommy Haas, France's Paul-Henri Mathieu and Greg Rusedski of England have also withdrawn from Indian Wells.

Australia's Mark Philippoussis and American Michael Chang have been awarded wildcards.

Radcliffe pulls out of World C'ships

Britain's Paula Radcliffe has opted not to try for a third successive cross country crown at the IAAF World Championships later this month in order to concentrate all her energies on the London mara

Radcliffe, who smashed the women's marathon record in Chicago last year, is focused on lowering her own mark of two hours 17 minutes 18 seconds in London on April 13.

"Paula's decision, taken after weeks of talks with her husband and trainers, reflects her determination to concentrate entirely on her main target, the London marathon," the English athletics association explained on Friday.

Radcliffe is the second big name to pull out of the March 29-30 event in Lausanne, Switzerland. Last month Ireland's Sonia O'Sullivan was forced to withdraw after injuring an Achilles tendon.
