Boro bodes not so well

Late planting, increased irrigation cost and scarcity of pesticides threaten to frustrate the prospects of a good boro harvest this year.

Farmers in Bogra, Rangpur and Dinajpur who got meagre yields of aman predicted a loss of boro crop.

The seedbeds were largely damaged by a prolonged foggy winter from December 19 to January 25 and the farmers in the northern region, known for hefty boro output, were late in planting

The appropriate time for boro planting is late December to January. But Mohammad Mantu Mia, a marginal farmer, purchased seeds from Chandmahal Bazaar in Gokul, Bogra, on March 17.

"Winter damaged seedbeds this year. And as the price of seeds was

as high as Tk 100 per 70 sheaves, I was waiting for a low price.' Although the price went down

plant the seeds in March.

Late planting is commonplace farther north in Rangpur and Dinajpur and will create a onemonth delay in harvesting.

The low use of urea in January manifests that boro has been planted late this year. According to sources in the Bangladesh Fertiliser Association (BFA), the demand for urea peaked in late February, unlike previous years.

Agriculture Minister Motiur Rahman Nizami claimed last Thursday that despite damage to seedbeds Bangladesh would reap 130 lakh metric tons of boro, as targeted by the government.

The farmers complained of a rise in power tariff and diesel price in the last one year.

Md Zakir Hossain, a young farmer of Fatehjanpur in Chirir Bandar, Dinajpur, says he has to bear the extra diesel cost of irrigation. "I have to spend Tk 200 more SEE PAGE 11 COL 6

7th prosecution witness cross-examined

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144 customs officials transferred

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) in a single order yesterday transferred more 144 customs

They have been asked to join their new offices by March 31.

All of them are inspector-level officials. Eighty per cent of them have been transferred from Benapole customs house to Khulna, and Jessore; and the rest from other customs houses to Dhaka, Chitagong and Mongla.

This is the second en masse transfer of customs officials in about four months. In November last year, 570 officials were transferred in a single order.

More 300 officials will be transferred to Dhaka and Chittagong soon, NBR sources said.

Fate of New Colony Independence playground hangs by thread

No decision was reached at an inter-ministerial meeting on the fate of the construction works at New Colony in Asad Gate yesterday as Housing Minister Mirza Abbas was determined to continue with the works, said meeting sources.

The meeting was held at the environment ministry with Minister Shajahan Siraj in the

At the meeting local member of he parliament Khondoker Mahbubuddin Ahmed protested and demanded the immediate cancellation of the works. The environment minister also expressed his concern as environmental laws do not permit construction in open spaces and playground

Sources said representatives of the housing department and the agency implementing the project, tried to justify the construction saying that it had been undertaken to meet the accommodation probm of government officials'

Recently the High Court had issued a stay order to postpone the construction and asked the government to show cause following a project that the housing department had undertaken to build 500 flats at the open spaces and play ground at New Colony.

"We have enough stock of kerosene in the country and there is no reason for any increase in its price", State Minister for Energy and Mineral Resources A K M Mosharraf Hossain said yesterday. The government yesterday

decided to form monitoring committee in each district, headed by the deputy commissioner (DC), to deal with the situation effectively, the state minister told reporters.
