Dhaka refutes **US** report on human rights

A foreign ministry spokesperson yesterday said the US report on human rights in Bangladesh is neither reflective of ground realities nor substantiated by adequate and up to date infor-

The US report said Bangladesh government's human rights record remained poor with numerous human

When asked to comment on the US State Department's reference to Bangladesh in its 'Country reports on Human Rights Practices 2002', the spokesperson said Bangladesh is fully committed to uphold internationally accepted standards of human rights and is a signatory to all international instruments on human rights.

"Bangladesh's commitments to these international standards are amply reflected in her national priorities. The country is on its way to consolidating democratic institutions. upholding democratic values, promoting rule of law and ensuring economic development and emancipation of the poorer sections of the society," the spokesperson said.

The spokesperson also said that Bangladesh's achievements in the socio-economic sectors for the advancement of women, children and minorities as well as her contribution to the global fight against terrorism are acknowledged and appreciated by the international community.

The spokesperson referred to a recent assessment of the US administration where Christina Rocca, US Assistant Secretary of State for South Asia in the Congressional Hearing held on 20 March 2003, termed

Both Arif and Nantu were arrested and four bombs recovered from their



Many American blacks in war oppose, yet fight

Michael Waters-Bev knew as soon as he opened his front door and saw three Marines officers in front of him that they were bringing bad news about his son in

Kendall Waters-Bey, a 29-year-old

son, appeared before televisions cameras at his family home in northeast $Baltimore \, to \, express \, his \, bitterness.$

"I want President Bush to get a good look at this, really good. This is the only son I had, only son," said Waters-Bey.

"The US government owes me an explanation," he added in an outburst on the motives for the US invasion that shocked many Americans for the

The dead man's sister, Michelle, said: "It's all for nothing, that war could have been prevented. Now, we're out of a brother. Bush is not out of a brother.

Waters-Bey was expressing anger

that many American Blacks feel about the war. While about 75 percent of white Americans support the war, according to a recent survey, 61 percent of blacks Prominent black figures ranging

from Congress members to rappers and the National Association for the Advancement of Coloured People (NAACP) have spoken out against the

"Black Americans are routinely told that there's not enough money for housing, medicine, education and rebuilding the inner city, but ... considerable sums can be raised for war and

Road accidents kill 11 in Gaibandha, Tangail

Eleven people were killed and 46 others injured in separate road accidents in Gaibandha and Tangail districts yester-

Of them, eight were killed in Gaibandha and the rest three in Tangail. Our Gaibandha Correspondent

reports: Eight people were killed and 31 others injured in two road mishaps on the Rangpur-Bogra Highway under Gobindaganj upazila yesterday morn-

At Mastha in Gobindaganj upazila, a Gaibandha bound night coach collided head on with a truck, leaving four persons killed on the spot and 29 others injured. Two of the injured succumbed to their injuries on way to Gaibandha hospital. The rest 27 bus passengers were admitted to the Raishahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH) and Gaibandha Health Complex.

The dead were identified as Mohammad Ali, 55, Moyen, 37, Barik Ali, 50, Akbar Ali, 40, Siddique, 35, and Saiibur Rahman, 33.

In the second road mishap, a Bogra bound stone loaded truck was hit by another truck from behind at Kalitola in the same upazila at around 10 am. Two pedestrians were killed on the spot and two other injured. Identity of the victims could not be known.

Two separate cases were filed with Gobindaganj police station.

In Tangail, three people were killed and 15 others injured when a truck overturned at Tartia Bhatkura point on the Dhaka-Tangail Highway early vesterday, according to BSS.

Natural fish resources are depleting at an alarming rate although overall fish production has almost doubled in the

cession from Muktangan in Dhaka yesterday.

Over fishing, habitat alteration, water pollution, poor water management and indiscriminate filling up of water bodies are mainly causing the decline in natural fish population. Replacement of natural fisheries (capture fisheries) by culture fisheries is neither possible nor desirable.

This was the view of participants at the inaugural session of a three-day workshop on "National Planning on Fisheries Research and Development"

workshop, jointly organised by the Bangladesh Fisheries Research Institute (BFRI) and the World Fish Center. The workshop is being held at the Bangladesh Agricultural Research

Director General of the BFRI Dr MA Mazid told the workshop 'restoration of bio-diversity' through strict enforcement of relevant regulations is a must to save the natural fish habitats.

Managing Director of the Grameen Bank Prof. Muhammad Yunus said fisheries sector has tremendous potential as Bangladesh possesses six per cent

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extreme poverty due lack of institutional support for procuring necessary fishing equipment like nets and boats. As a result, they are exploited by those who supply the equipment, Yunus said.

"Our fishermen are skilled and willing to work hard but we have failed to provide them institutional support,"

He said if the financial organisations come forward to give them loans to buy their own fishing equipment, their condition would greatly **SEE PAGE 11 COL 3**
