### City sweats on power outage

City residents experienced frequent power outages throughout vesterday although official figure of load shedding is very low

It was a dreadful day for the city dwellers, specially children and elderly persons, who grumbled over the power trouble. After the sweltering summer heat and energy-sapping humidity, the frequent power disruptions were too

The temperature rose to 35.3 degrees

Dhaka Electricity Supply Authority (DESA) Control Room said the usual demand for power in the city is 1,200 megawatt (MW) and it was supplying 1.111 MW in the evening.

It claimed that the total load shedding yesterday was 36 MW. And in the evening, it was 20 MW.

But many residents in Mirpur, Tejgoan, Paribagh, Kamalapur, Basabo and Baridhara said power outage in their areas was frequent. "There was no electricity for about an hour in the

morning and for about an hour in the evening, too," said a resident at Tejgoan.

Officials said DESA is capable of meeting the power demand. But sometimes it has to snap power supply to save transformers from damage as the transmission system is overburdened.

DESA Chairman MA Rab on Friday said DESA transmission lines are in a bad shape due to lack of necessary repair and maintenance, which some times causes power outages



#### Withdrawalof funding won't affect health services:Saifur

Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday said with drawal of donors' funding to the country's Health and Population Sector Programme (HPSP) would not affect the health services.

"Rather, it'll be more reinforced," he told newsmen following the inauguration of a 3-day national health conference at Hotel Sheraton in the

Saifur said the health sector has been carrying out three billion dollars programme for the last five years and it will have another three billion dollars

Withdrawal of US\$100 million to US\$200 million for any excuse would not affect a population of 140 million too much, he felt. The World Bank has decided to

suspend US\$123 million fund from the government's HPSP due to "failure in implementation" of the reforms as per the donors' prescription.

Inaugurating the conference, the Finance Minister said the government has decided on a reassessment of the HPSP, as it was forced upon without relevance to the basic objectives of the health sector. "Unfortunately, it was not implemented in the last five years."

## Ban may go on women seeking jobs abroad

The government is likely to withdraw the ban on sending female workers abroad, especially to the oil-rich Middle East countries

Bangladeshi female workers have a huge scope of household jobs in these

Sources said the expatriate welfare and overseas employment ministry will place a proposal at today's meeting of the cabinet committee on manpower export to withdraw the ban imposed in

The ministry thinks that if the ban is withdrawn, at least two lakh female workers could get employment in Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Oatar and other countries in the region within a short time.

Ambassadors of some of those countries in Dhaka, while talking with government officials on various occasions, expressed their desire to hire female workers on a large scale.

People in those countries prefer Muslim women for household work because they want their children to be looked after by women of the same religion. Several lakh non-Muslim women are now engaged in such activities, the sources mentioned.

The ban was imposed following allegations of physical abuse of female workers abroad. Now, only female doctors, nurses, engineers and highly skilled workers can go abroad for jobs.

Meanwhile, the ministry has also proposed evolving some mechanism to protect female workers from sexual abuse. It would set up monitoring cells at Bangladesh missions in those countries to monitor the situation and take action if any allegation is received.

The cabinet committee formed about two months back is going meet for the first time today. Minister without Harunur SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

## Summer diseases creep upwards

#### Over 300 hospitalised since Sunday

As the weather gets hot and humid, seasonal diseases like viral fever, cough, dysentery, dehydration and diarrhoea have been reported in the

Doctors say mostly children are being attacked.

At the Cholera Hospital in Mahakhali, more than 300, mostly children, have been hospitalised since Sunday for diarrhoea and dysentery alone.

"In case of viral infection the patient suffers from fever for two to three days and the temperature goes very high. The patient should be prescribed Paracetamol," says Child Specialist Professor Md Sirajul


"If needed anti-biotic can be given. Precaution should be taken so that the patient is not exposed to too much cold." Dr. Islam suggested taking

plenty of liquid food as well as other normal food and fruit juice in case of diarrhoeal attack to keep body fluid in balance. Green coconut, woodapple, cucumber are also helpful.

"In case of children the flow of urine should be normal. If the child does not urinate for five to six hours parents should consult

## One to die for throwing acid on lawyer

One person was sentenced to death by a tribunal yesterday for throwing acid on a lawyer in the city's Dhanmondi area on October 7 last year.

ATM Fazle Kabir, Judge of the Tribunal for Control of Acid Crime, Dhaka, passed the verdict at a packed courtroom in presence of the convict.

The tribunal found Mohammad Sadeq Hossain of Jinzira under Keraniganj Police Station, Dhaka, guilty of throwing acid on Advocate Sudhir Ranjan Ghotak and delivered the judgement.

The judge took his seat at 12.30pm and wanted to know Sadeq's father's name. Later, he (judge) read out some

The judge also fined Sadeq Tk one lakh as compensation for the victim, and directed the deputy commissioner (DC) to realise the money from the property of the convict and to give it to the victim

The convict can file an appeal with the High Court against the judgement within 60 days

Advocate Sudhir Ranjan Ghotak, the victim, was present in the court. He said that he was satisfied with the judgement but he lost his eyes forever.
