US shooting spree Scientists spot kills four more The World Health Organization (WHO) yesterday announced that a new pathogen, a member of the coronavirus family never before seen

in humans, is the cause of the Severe STAR DESK Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS).

At least four people were killed and several others wounded yesterday by gunshots near the government buildings in the northern Iraqi city of Mosul, the second such incident in as many days, a hospital official and witnesses said.

US troops fired on a crowd from the rooftops of the buildings, several witnesses told AFP. One of the wounded, an Iraqi policeman, said police at a station a few hundred metres from the government buildings had opened fire to disperse looters trying to rob a bank.

Meanwhile, the death toll in

Tuesday's shootings near the same buildings rose to 15 with 28 wounded, according to hospital sources.

US forces admitted partial responsibility for Tuesday's incidents, when witnesses also said American troops fired on a crowd, admitting yesterday that they had killed "around seven" of the victims.

"Fire was indeed delivered from coalition forces, it was lethal fire and some Iraqis were killed as a result, we think the number is in the order of seven and we think there were some wounded as well," said Brigadier General Vincent Brooks at US Central Command's war base in Oatar

Yesterday, an AFP journalist saw two bodies arrive at the city's Al-Zahrawi hospital, where a doctor said eight people were also wounded. "Four bodies have just been brought in," Dr Riyadh Hamdi said.

Witnesses told AFP that US troops stationed on top of the government buildings had opened fire, but a US army spokesman would only confirm that an incident had taken place.

An Iraqi police officer, who had only just resumed duties after the overthrow of the Saddam Hussein regime last week, said his men had intervened in a bank raid when the Americans started shooting. SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

Unocal protests move to award gas field to Niko STAR REPORT

US oil giant Unocal yesterday officially protested a government move to award an unexplored gas field to a Canadian company, Niko Resources, in the name of marginal gas field development.

Threatening arbitration, Unocal said the move violated its Production Sharing Contract (PSC) for Block 12 with Petrobangla. The unexplored gas field, Chhatak East, is located in Block 12 but was not given to Unocal as it was marked 'ring-fenced' or reserved by Petrobangla

In a letter to the energy ministry, Unocal said if the government wanted to open up this area for exploration and development, it should get priority as the company was working in the areas surrounding the gas field.

Pro-war leaders at Athens summit spark protest

Dozens of people were arrested yester day following scuffles at an anti-war march as protesters labelled as "butchers" the pro-war leaders of Britain, Italy and Spain who are in the Greek capital for an EU summit

With the war in Iraq winding down, young communists and antiglobalisation activists massed in the city centre, partly cordoned off by a 10,000strong police force, to denounce what they called the US occupation of Iraq. Police estimated the turnout at 3,000

people, Greek media at double that figure -- a far cry from the mass anti-war rallies of recent months which drew several hundred thousand into the streets of Athens

About 100 hooded and masked youths on the protest sidelines hurled Molotov cocktails and other objects at the British, French, Italian and US embassies and several banks.

Police fired tear gas into the air to scatter the troublemakers, and made dozens of arrests, before the demonstrators marched on, cough
