The TVS Cup is up for grabs today and both India and South Africa cannot afford to experi-

ment anymore. When the final of the tri-series begins this afternoon at the Bangabandhu National Stadium, Indian skipper Sauray Ganguly and his South African counterpart Graeme Smith will be drawing the battle-lines with their best available resources.

The day-night clash is scheduled for a 2pm start with Bangladesh Television and STAR Sports providing

With the score level at 1-1after the preliminary phase of the 10-day competition, the third meeting promises to be something special. India won the first battle of the heavyweights by inflicting a 153-run defeat on April 14. However, the Proteas bounced back with a five-wicket win when the two teams met on Friday The new South African captain

believes that the win on Friday will certainly give them the psychological edge over the Indians whom he still regarded as the favourites.

"I think the momentum is now with us. The Indians were not in the business yesterday (Friday). So they need to be more serious tomorrow. I think

t's going to be an exciting match," said the 22-year-old Smith who replaced Shaun Pollock after the World Cup.

"It's going to be a big day for South African cricket after we missed the World Cup final. I still believe that the Indian start as favourites. But have to put in lots of hard work in the final.'

Smith revealed that Neil McKenzie and Allan Dawson were playing good cricket and he expected more from them on Sunday

ready to play Test cricket for England. The Lancashire youngster shone in the one-day team during the winter and now he believes he is ready for the Test team as well.

Anderson, 20, has had a meteoric rise which culminated with two manof-the-match awards in the World Cup.

And a two-Test series against a weakened Zimbabwe outfit, starting on May 22, would appear the ideal opportunity for him to showcase his talents in the five-day game.

Anderson told the BBC Sport website: "I'm definitely ready to give Test cricket a go after the experience had in the winter. "I've got a taste for it and I will be

ready if I get the call." Anderson still finds it hard to reflect

on his amazing last 12 months which have seen him rise from the Lancashire second XI to be England's best bowler at the World cup. In Cape Town against Pakistan, he

was the clear match-winner with four

top wickets and he seems to have developed the happy knack of getting good batsmen out. Anderson said: "The World Cup was

A series of family tragedies and drug addiction turned Sir John Paul Getty II who died at the London Clinic on Thursday morning, into a mysterious

Known as Sir Paul, he settled in Britain, but was rarely seen as he donated vast sums from the Getty family fortune to causes in his adopted country. Born in California in 1932, Sir Paul

was a son of J Paul Getty, the oil tycoon and reputedly the richest man in the

He studied at San Francisco University and served in the US Army in Korea, before joining the family oil business in Italy.

His second wife was Talitha Pol, granddaughter of the artist Augustus

Their hippie lifestyle included the use of hard drugs, and Talitha died of a heroin overdose in 1971 the first tragedy to blight the life of her husband.

The second came two years later. when Sir Paul's eldest son Paul, then 17, was kidnapped by Italian terrorists, who demanded a ransom of more than 3 million dollars. The boy's grandfather refused to
