Vessel of death full of bodies

106 retrieved so far, 100 more feared trapped inside upturned launch on Buriganga

At least 106 people, many of them children, drowned in Monday's launch capsize in the Buriganga off Pagla Mary Anderson Ghat during a

"There might be 15 more bodies inside the vessel," Deputy Assistant Director of Fire Service Manjur Kader said on the scene yesterday.

Survivors said an estimated 100 people, including five ansars, were still missing after MV Mitali-3 went down in the Buriganga with over 400 passengers on board.

Our Brahmanbaria correspondent quoting survivors said about 52 passengers were trapped inside another launch, A M Mozlishpur, which sank in the Meghna off Parishayar village on Monday during a nor'wester.

The vessel was heading to Debidar upazila in Comilla district from Astagram in Kishoreganj with a bridal party on board.

Meanwhile, rescuers from navy, fire service and water transport authorities continued operation to search out the missing and rescue those still trapped inside the sunken, upside down MV Mitali-3.

Of the 106 fished out bodies, 90 were identified by relatives till 8:00pm

Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) sources said rescue vessel Hamza was on way to Pagla from Barisal to salvage the sunken ship.

"No doubt, there are some bodies inside, but our rescue team could not recover those as they were deep inside the launch," said Lieutenant Zillur Rahman, a diving officer of Bangladesh

He said the incident took place due to faulty design of the launch.

Rescue ship Rustam reached the scene early vesterday, but could not salvage the 150-tonne launch, too SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Plying of vessels banned from 3pm to 8pm

The government has decided to impose a restriction on plying of passenger launches between 3.00pm to 8.00pm in the evening, during the Bengali month of Baishakh.

The decision, effective from today, was taken to avoid launch mishaps during this time because of frequent nor'westers, according to sources. Talking to BBC Bengali service, ship-

ping minister Akbar Hossain said passenger launches would not be allowed to leave

He said that a study of the weather pattern of the last 10 years has revealed that the risk of a launch mishap was the highest in the evening.

He further said that the governmen could not adopt the necessary measures to prevent launch accidents owing to lack of manpower.

According to sources, four passenger launches have been lost in nor'westers so

Market pegged exchange rate likely by June

Major NCB reforms planned to get IMF funds

Bangladesh is likely to opt for a floating exchange rate by June to get antipoverty funds from the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

As part of a deal, the government has agreed to wide-ranging reforms in the nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) -- privatising Rupali Bank, putting the management of Agrani Bank in private hands and restricting large loans from the state-owned banks, according to sources.

If the conditions are met, the government will get about \$2 billion for three years, it was agreed in a wrapup meeting on the interim poverty reduction strategy paper (IPRSP) with the IMF vesterday

"The IMF says that we would not face any problem by introducing floating exchange rate and that it can be done right now. But we are hesitant. We would take the decision after discussing with exporters, chambers revenue expenditure review commissions," Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman said yesterday after the

He said many regional countries including India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Nepal have introduced floating exchange rate and Bangladesh cannot remain isolated with controlled exchange rate regime for long.

"We need to do that. But it is very risky to go for floating exchange rate with a poor foreign exchange reserve,

Exporters, facing stiff competition in the global market, would be bene-

fited if the rate is deregulated, he said. "A market-based exchange rate would be a big incentive for them and

quite difficult," he pointed out. And if the IMF fund is available, the annual development porgramme

(ADP) size would also increase. "If everything goes well, the ADP size would be Tk 3,000 crore to Tk 4,000 crore bigger than this year's. Loans from donors depend on some political decisions and we need to discuss these issues in the parliament," Saifur said and hinted that the ADP size for the next year may
