

### Hosts under pressure already

SPORTS REPORTER from Chittagong Bangladesh threw away a solid start to

be bowled out for a paltry total on the first day of the first Test against South Africa at the MA Aziz Stadium in Chittagong yesterday.

Bangladesh were all out for 173 after Khaled Mahmud won his first toss as Test captain and elected to bat. And despite a customary half-century from one-down Habibul Bashar, the other batsmen failed to put any fight against the accurate South African bowlers. At stumps South Africa were 84 for two with Jacques Rudolph and Boeta Dippenaar batting on 15 and 16 respectively.

Bashar, the most prolific home batsman, who has played in all of Bangladesh's 18 Test matches, scored a cultured 60 off 87 balls in 138 minutes. It was the right-hander's 10th fifty in Test cricket. He hit ten fours.

Coming to bat after Bangladesh had lost opener Mehrab Hossain for six, Bashar steadied the innings with a 83run second wicket partnership with opener Javed Omar. At lunch, Bangladesh were refreshingly poised on 97 for one

### Report submitted to PM

The cabinet committee on NGO affairs has suggested a ban on all sorts of "political activities" by the nongovernment organisations (NGOs). Chairman of the committee LGRD Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan

handed over a 138-page report on the proposed NGO policy to Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday. "The prime minister might form an

implementation committee or send it to the parliament for ratification after scrutiny by the ministry or the NGO Affairs Bureau," Bhuiyan told a press conference.

He said that the NGOs have been supporting the country's development without any policy. "Now, we are formulating the policy for giving a fillip to their activities and improve supervision on them," he added.

Formation of Iraq govt starts next week: Garner **REUTERS**, Baghdad

US administrator Jay Garner said vesterday the process of forming a government in Iraq would start by the end of next week

"I think you'll begin to see the governmental process start next week, by the end of next week. It will have Iraqi faces on it. It will be governed by the Iragis," the retired US general told a news conference in Baghdad.

He gave no details. As part of the process of replacing Saddam Hussein's government, a number of Iraqi political groupings are to meet in Baghdad on Monday with US officials, following an initial meeting near Nassiriya last week.

Garner will lead an interim administration that will oversee the rebuilding of Iraq. The interim administration plans then to hand over to an Iraqi government.

Garner said Ahmad Chalabi, leader of the Iraqi National Congress, was not Washington's choice to lead Iraq, despite his reputation as an American favourite

**STAFF CORRESPONDENT** Different brands of soybean oil available in the market contain health-detrimental elements, according to a research. Continuous intakes of the elements -- radical oxygen and hydroxyl -- may cause intestinal diseases, said the study carried out by Proshika in cooperation with several scientists. Lack of proper packaging and storage has been blamed for the presence of the elements in different brands of soybean oil. The research was carried out on 42 samples of well-known brands and open containers randomly collected from Gazipur, Khulna, Rajshahi and Chittagong, said a Proshika press release yesterday. Physicians say most edible oils

contain a high level of saturated fatty acid, which causes heart diseases.

The study, however, said soybean oil contains essential fatty acids like oleic acid and linoleic acid on an appropriate level, which are hygienic. Proshika will carry out a follow-up research after three months, based on precautionary measures to be taken by oil producers, as the centre informed the producers about it.


