The government and rescue services, including the military, faced severe criticism then over their slow and ineffectual reaction to the disaster. Since then rescue operations have been revised but not put to any serious test.

Meanwhile, Turkish police fired in the air on yesterday to scatter an angry crowd demanding more help from authorities after an earthquake that killed more than 100 people, including about 40 children in a boarding school.

Working through the night, rescue workers dug into the floodlit wreckage of the school dormitory to try to reach scores more children still buried since the quake on Thursday morning.

Asia proved to be the most dangerous continent for journalists -- with 11 killed there in 2002 -and the most repressive, with the highest number of reporters attacked, threatened, arrested, imprisoned and censored.

The situation in Africa revealed some rays of hope, with Benin, Botswana, Cape Verde, Mali, Mauritius and South Africa lauded for being particularly respectful of the rights of journalists.

The RSF added some new names to the list, which includes 42 heads of state, ministers, armed guerrilla groups and security orces accused of targeting report-

in Fallujah died Thursday, but not in hostilities. Army officials said the solider from the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment - whose name was not released - drowned when a tank plunged into a canal.

In another incident Thursday, an Apache helicopter destroyed a truck after a US drone aircraft spotted four men loading ammunition onto the vehicle on the east side of the Tigris River. The four

Iraqis were killed, according to Col. Don Campbell of the 4th Infantry Division's 1st Brigade.

After the attack, 13 Iraqis came to the area and were seen loading ammunition onto other vehicles. Apaches fired on a building where the men took refuge, triggering secondary explosions that suggested ammunition was stored nside, Campbell said.

In Baghdad, elation turned to chaos when a large propane tank exploded while people fired guns in the air to celebrate the return of electricity to their neighborhood. US soldiers who arrived in tanks were confronted by an angry crowd complaining that the troops should have done more to help those injured by the explosion. Seven Iraqis were burnt to death in the incident.

> Vajpayee offered to sit down to talks with Pakistan during an April 17-18 tour of Kashmir, the disputed Muslim-majority Himalayan region at the core of 55 years of tensions between the South Asian giants.

Pakistan had called repeatedly for dialogue but India had always rejected talks until the cessation of alleged infiltration of anti-India Islamic rebels from Pakistan territory into Indian areas. New Delhi accuses Islamabad of backing the rebels, a charge denied by Islamabad.

Vajpayee later qualified his peace offer by repeating New Delhi's precondition of an end to infiltration. Jamali nevertheless seized on the offer and in his unprecedented call on Monday invited Vajpayee to Pakistan for talks and offered to travel to New Delhi himself.

"This is a very good sign. I think it is a new beginning after the Agra summit," Musharraf said, referring to the July 2001 summit in the Indian city, the last time the two sides formally met.

The Pakistani president said he detected "a growing realisation among the Indian leadership" that 'meaningful" dialogue was the only way to ease tensions on the nuclear-ready subcontinent.
