SSA loses legal battle over private port

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday declared illegal the approval of and follow-up works for construction of two private terminals at Patenga and Narayanganj by the Stevedoring Services of America (SSA).

Yesterday, the seven-member Appellate Division headed by Chief man of the Chittagong Port filed a Justice Mainur Reza Chowdhury dismissed the leave to appeal petition.

The High Court verdict held that the process of obtaining approval for setting up private terminals by the SSA Bangladesh Ltd. was not transparent. The court ruled it arbitrary and illegal.

The court also found that the incorporation process of the SSA Bangladesh Ltd. was also obtained through presentation of false information as one of the two joint venture partners-- SSA Netherlands BV -- was found nonexistent.

Wife of former deputy speaker Humayun Khan Panni was strangled at her Dhanmondi residence in the early hours of yesterday by unknown killers.

Sultana Panni, 70, was found lying on her face in the balcony of her bedroom. Her hands and legs were tied and mouth taped.

The killers also tied up the former deputy speaker in the bedroom of House No. 31 of Road No. 15 at Dhanmondi. A mobile

none, which she bought on the day of the occurrence, was missing and someone made a call from the phone at 3:30am.

"It was not an incident of robbery," Khan Sayed Hasan, deputy commissioner of the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP), south zone, told The Daily Star. The killers ransacked rooms on the first floor just to make it look like a robbery, he said. The family kept valuables in banks, sources said.

"The killers were professional and very much familiar with the family," he said, adding that the

victim might have been killed in an attempt to grab her huge property. Cook of the house, Alauddin



Piling pillar tragedy South-western region

A teenage girl died when a huge iron bar used for piling fell on her at Pallabi yesterday.

Rina Begum of Chalantika Basti was taking bath in her slum bathroom adjacent to an under-construction building of a garment factory, Jita Garments, at 2:00pm.

The bar suddenly fell on the bathroom, smashing it and injuring Rina badly.

She was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where the on-duty doctors declared her dead.

A garment worker, the 19-yearold victim was to go to her factory after bath.

Rina's mother, Sajeda Begum, filed a murder case with the Mirpur Police Station against the owner of Jita Garments

Police arrested Manik, supervisor of the construction site, in the afternoon.

The incident followed a similar accident at the Elephant Road on Wednesday in which Parveen Akhter Putul, 22, an attendant of Mastermind School of Dhanmondi died. A piling pillar fell on her, killing her instantly. No case was filed and police arrested none.

Jail rejoinder

Transport owners and workers have threatened a 48-hour strike in South-western zone from May 22 to realise their nine-point demand.

Abdur Gaffar Biswas, senior Vice-President of Khulna city BNP and Convenor of South-Western Zone Unit of Road Transport Owners' and Workers Association, gave the threat at a press conference here yesterday morning.

The demands include with-drawal of cases filed against transport owners and workers, reduction of prices of petroleum prod-ucts, formation of Workers' Welfare Fund, construction of bus and truck terminals in all districts across the country, stoppage of

tolls by police and political hoodums and compensation for families of drivers and workers killed in highway robberies.

Buses, mini buses, trucks, tank lorries, auto rickshaws, auto tem-pos and engine boats will come under the purview of the proposed 48-hour transport strike in the South-western zone and greater Faridpur district, said BNP leader Abdul Gaffer Biswas who was arrested by joint forces during 'Operation Clean Heart' for his alleged involvement in drug trade and other criminal activities.

He has also demanded of the government to stop import of reconditioned trucks, buses and mini buses.

Jubo Dal leader gunned down

Unidentified criminals shot dead a Jatiyatabadi Jubo Dal leader and injured another at Mirpur Majar Róad last night.

Mohammad Ali, 38, general secretary of ward No. 10, and his friend Mohammad Hasan were in a conversation on a playing ground at Majar Road at the time of the inci-dent at about 7:45pm.

A gang of four rinopini. cycles went there and pumped bullets on them. Severely injured, the two were rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where Ali was declared dead.

The reason behind the killing could not be known immediately.

The duty officer of the Mirpur Police Station said they were informed of the incident but failed to give any details. No case has been filed as yet.
