Small textile nations seen as China buffer by 2005

Small textile producing nations would remain in business by providing a buffer against supply disruptions in China after a deregulation of the US garment industry in 2005, trade officials said Friday.

However, competition would be fierce and just 10 of the world's 50 garment producing countries would keep their industries with China the overwhelmingly dominant player, George White of the US State Department, said.

"Unfortunately, Cambodia currently cannot compete in costs terms with large producers like China," added White, who is director for the Office of International Labor Affairs.

But companies would still need alternative producers to ensure stability against disruptions in China that could be caused by political turmoii or in the latest example, Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome.

White is in Cambodia for a four day visit to inspect Cambodia's garment industry which benefits from a favourable quota system in the US that has underpinned this country's sole economic success

But under agreements with the World Trade Organization the US quota system will end on January 1, 2005 and be replaced by a deregulated industry that will allow all WTO members to freely trade textiles to the US. White said small countries, like

Cambodia, would have to join the WTO, develop niche markets and maintain a healthy reputation in order to compete against goods produced en-masse in China.

Brand name companies, like Nike and Reebok, would also seek out alternative suppliers based in three or four countries that meet union standards for the treatment of workers set out by the International Labor Organisation

"This sense of corporate responsibility is spreading," White

He said corporates that failed to pay basic wages and deny union access to the workforce would probably abandon Cambodia for China once the new trading regime
