PDB to tap wind power

An agreement was signed yester-day between the Power Development Board (PDB) and the Infrastructure Investment Facilitation Centre (IIFC) to gener-ate wind-powered electricity in

It will help generate 10-megawatt power in coastal areas, said a PDB press release.

As per the agreement, the IIFC will provide technical and PDB financial support to run a feasibility study in the coastal belt.

M Sirajuddulah, secretary of the PDB, and Golam Mostafa, company secretary of the IIFC, signed the agreement.

The Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) is now ready for aerial spraying of larvicide to combat mosquitoes.

Though the pilots are now being trained for the operation, the larvicide will probably be sprayed in the next Culex mosquito season, DCC officials said at a press conference vector day.

"We're now fully equipped with aircraft and trained pilot to combat the mosquito menace. But we are yet to decide when to start the spraying," said AZM Shafiqul Islam, chief executive officer of the

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GDP to gyrate up

Agriculture, manufacturing, transport to see big jump

The GDP growth this fiscal has been projected at 5.33 per cent, 0.91 percentage point higher than last fiscal's, according to the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS).

In arriving at the tentative growth rate, it has been expected that agriculture, which accounts for 16.82 per cent of GDP, would see a big jump to 3.59 per cent from last fiscal's negative growth of 0.62 per cent.

It has been estimated that this year's cereal production will be high at 268.94 lakh tonnes, which was 259.06 lakh tonnes last fiscal.

Aman rice production has been shown quite high at 111.15 lakh tonnes, although private field reports

say aman yield had been quite dismal. The field reports have been corroborated by high paddy price and a huge cereal import of 2.4 million tonnes.

The second largest contributing sector -- manufacturing which contributes 15.94 per cent to GDP -- would also see 1.14 percentage point more growth from last fiscal's and would structed to 6.2 percent. would stand at 6.62 per cent. Transport, storage and commu-

nication, which accounts for 10.76 per cent of GDP, will see 7.33 per cent growth against last fiscal's 6.56 per

The BBS has also adjusted the share of different sectors to GDP. Agriculture's share has gone down from last fiscal's 17.46 to 16.82 per cent this fiscal, manufacturing's has increased from last fiscal's 15.86 to 15.94 per cent, transport's has gone up from 9.69 to 10.76 per cent, and community, social and personal service's share has gone up from 8.99 to

9.20 per cent. Real estate's contribution has decreased from 9.11 to 8.82 per cent.

Last fiscal, the GDP growth rate was provisionally put at 4.8 per cent and then it was revised down to 4.42

In his last budget speech, Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman had said this fiscal's GDP would grow by about six per cent. However, the Asian Development Bank (ADB) had forecast a 5.2 per cent growth.

BAC probes BSS project on human rights

The Bureau of Anti-corruption (BAC) is investigating alleged corruption and irregularities in the Tk 75.02 lakh Improvement and Promotion of Human Rights Issues project at the state-run Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha (BSS).

The Danish International Development Agency (Danida) funded the project to promote human rights issues and create public awareness through news reports. It gave the fund as part of its support to human rights and good governance programme in

BAC sources said they are now conducting a 'comprehensive investigation' as per instructions from the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) to immediately identify persons involved in misappropriating the Danida fund.

Earlier, during preliminary inquiries into allegations received from various quarters, the BAC detected embezzlement of fund allocated under various heads. These include manpower, training workshop, seminar, travel cost, investigative reports, general reporting and equipment.

The World Bank (WB) yesterday it would lend roughly 550 million dollars to Bangladesh as a first installment of development funds under a three-year plan.

The amount, to be finalised at a meeting of the Bank's board of directors in Washington on June 19, is expected to nearly double the 300 million dollars provided last year, said Frederick Temple, the WB country director for

"The first chunk of the World Bank financial support will be given without any judgement [on performance]," Temple told

But he said the second installment of the loan, aimed to help the South Asian nation achieve economic growth and fight poverty, would be made after a performance assessment.

Temple, who is to return to Washington later this year at the end of his three-year tenure in Bangladesh, praised various initiatives in economic and other fields made in the first 15 months of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia's

He said donors "want to see evidence of commitment to change and initiate steps to change before we come with financing." "We don't say everything is perfect. We go on saying there is very promising initiation of stabilisation (and) structural reforms," he said, adding that there was still a big agenda on the table.

Temple's comments came a week after a Bangladesh Develop-ment Forum (BDF) donors meeting praised Dhaka for achieving reforms but cautioned that it needed to do more on human rights, governance and crime. Bangladesh wants two billion

dollars from the BDF, which groups the World Bank, the IMF, the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and donor countries including Australia, France, Japan, Britain and the United States.
