Water project to mitigate arsenic poison may get new term

The Bangladesh Arsenic Mitigation Water Supply Project (BAMWSP) may be extended for another three

years, officials said vesterday. The World Bank (WB) credit for the US\$ 44 million project is closing on June 30. Earlier, it was extended for nine months after its expiry in September 2002.

A team of experts from the WB headquarters in Washington, US. left the city last week after examining different aspects of the fouryear project

Officials said a three-member team of the WB reviewed recent progress of the project and expressed satisfaction but the officials are still unhappy with the pace of the project, which is supposed to provide alternative source of safe drinking water to arsenic affected areas. However, mitigation activities are still very limited and only a few upazila have been provided with mitigation services. Tubewell testing has been completed in 147 out of 268 upazila.

According to sources, the WB and its co-financiers have placed two conditions for lending further

Video camera in HSC exam centres to curb cheating

Chairman of the board Professor Nazrul Islam revealed this to journalists yesterday ahead of the exams scheduled to start on

"The video camera checking system will be in place during examinations of the first five compulsory subjects, and all concerned have already been notified about the decision," he said.

"The district administration concerned would bear all the expenses to set up the video cam-

Eight special teams, each of five government officials, will launch a drive to the trouble-prone centres, while 250 other vigilance teams will be on regular visit to all the centres.

4 US soldiers killed in Iraqi guerilla attacks

Four US soldiers were killed in a flare-up of guerilla attacks in Iraq that continued for a second day yesterday, marring the US-led administration's claim that postwar reconstruction is steaming

Eleven soldiers were also wounded in the four incidents.

A soldier was killed early vesterday and seven others wounded when they came under attack in the flashpoint town of Fallujah from a "hostile force of unknown

US Central Command said the army unit responded "decisively

with concentrated fire," killing two of the attackers and capturing six

Initial reports are that the attackers fired from a mosque in

On Monday before sundown, an attack targeted the main highway between the massive US military camp at Baghdad airport and the occupation headquarters in the

An explosion destroyed the lead armoured car in a three-vehicle convoy and shook surrounding

US commanders told an AFP correspondent on the scene that an unknown attacker had thrown a bag packed with an explosive

The "satchel charged munition" had detonated the rounds inside the armoured vehicle, which was "turned into ash," said Lieutenant Colonel Scott Rutter of the 3rd Infantry Division.

The three soldiers in the lead vehicle were wounded, along with a fourth who went to the rescue and was wounded by the secondary blast, Rutter said Monday night. One of the soldiers later died.

"The second vehicle engaged the individual but the individual got away. He was shot and wounded and ran away across the

highway," Rutter added.

Six or seven black-clad Saddam Fedayeen guerrillas, two brandish ing large portraits of the ousted strongman, were seen celebrating their spectacular daylight attack on the US military convoy, witnesses told AFP vesterday.

"They were waving their Kalashnikovs and Saddam pictures in the air," one witness said, adding that there were tunnel networks on either side of the road that had been formerly used by Iraqi secu-



Civil society M.Phil. students decries WTO lose session to DU laxity duplicity

A civil society forum yesterday criticised the World Trade Organisation (WTO) for its 'unequal, immoral' regulations that further marginalised the least developed countries (LDCs).

The Dhaka Civil Society Forum (DCSF) also blamed the WTO for non-implementation of the pledges it made to the LDCs in its different ministerial declarations.

The concerns were aired at a press briefing at the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), attended by CPD Executive Director Dr Debapriya Bhattacharya, Regional

Media and Advocacy Coordinator for South Asia Mona Laczo and Dr Zafar Ullah Chowdhury of Consumers Association of Bangladesh (CAB), among others.

"The WTO has not yet implemented the LDC agenda, adopted in the Doha declaration. But it implemented those taken in favour of developed countries," said the CPD executive director.

Mona Laczo said the WTO trade rules were crafted to favour rich countries.

The DCSF, formed mainly to

Palestinian Information Minister Nabil Amr said in a statement that the meeting between Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas had been put off for "technical rea-

He said he still expected the talks to go ahead at some stage in the next 48 hours. Other Palestinian officials said they hoped the meeting would be held

An Israeli political source also said a meeting had been planned today but that the Palestinians had sought a postponemen because of a visit to the West Bank city of Ramallah by Spanish Foreign Minister Ana Palacio.

"No new date was set," the Israeli source said.

Hundreds of Asian women sex slaves in Australia

Australia's top crime agency yesterday revealed it was examining allegations that hundreds of young women were being lured from Asia with promises of work and then forced to work as

The Australian Crime Commission (ACC) said trafficking in sex slaves was probably linked to the people smuggling operations run by organised crime syndicates that have been the focus of border control efforts in recent years.

ACC chief executive officer Alastair Milroy told a parliamentary committee that his agency began gathering intelligence on sex slavery in the last month and planned to report its findings in The investigation comes as

the Australian government faces rising pressure to stamp out sex slavery. There have been reports that children as young as 12 are being forced into prostitution.

New South Wales state minister for Women Sandra Nori said last week that many Asian prostitutes were offered well-paid work in Sydney and then held in brothels and forced to "pay off" debts of up to 50,000 dollars (32,500 dollars US).

"These women and children are literally being held hostage by

predators who take their pass-ports and enslave them into prostitution," Nori told the NSW

The women are believed to come from across Asia, including Thailand, Cambodia, China, Korea and Vietnam.

Australia passed laws designed to outlaw the trade in sex slaves in 1998 but critics question why there have been no charges or prosecutions in almost five years. Kathleen Maltzahan, a

A court here yesterday sentenced seven people to life imprisonment for murdering AL leader Sardar Harunur Rashid in 2001.

Additional District and Sessions Judge (First Court) Didar Ali Fakir also fined the convicts Tk 5,000 each, in default of which they would have to serve an additional six-month jail term. The convicted seven are Abdus

Salam alias Salam Majhi, Moniruzzaman, Abdur Rashid Tapu, Abdur Rashid Tapan, Mahfuzur Rahman alias Nasim Rony Matubbar alias Tariq and Alam. The last five men, all cadres of the Purbo Banglar Communist Party, were tried in absentia

Six other accused in the case -Tauhidul Islam, Humayun Kabir, Kamal alias Abul Kalam, Kajol alias Khalil, Kuddus and Imam Jamaddar -- were acquitted.

The prosecution story in brief is that the accused gunned down the Awami League leader at about 6am on February 23, 2001 in front of his house at Gagan Babu road under Khulna thana as he was on his way back home from the nearby mosque after Fajr prayers. The killers exploded bombs and fired blank shots as they left the scene.

On the following day, Razia Khatoon, wife of the victim lodged an FIR with Khulna thana in this SEE PAGE 11 COL 3
