Plant trees to avert environmental disaster: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia has called upon all to join a three-month long tree plantation movement by planting at least 39 crore new trees in the next three months.

"Let each and every member of the family plant one tree a month. I would like to see our nation of 13 crore people plant at least 39 crore new trees during the next three months," Khaleda Zia said while inaugurating the three-month long National Tree Plantation Movement and Tree Fair-2003 at the National Parade Square yesterday.

She said in the backdrop of the country's heavily depleted forest resources due to massive felling of trees and destruction of forests, it is imperative to plant a lot of trees to save the country from the looming environmental disaster.

Leaders bury Iraq hatchet

Chirac welcomes Bush to Economic Summit

World leaders sought to put the deep divisions of the Iraq war behind them by demonstrating a more united front on efforts to combat poverty and AIDS in the developing world.

President Bush had a smile and firm handshake for this year's Group of Eight nations summit host. French President Jacques Chirac. The French leader, with whom Bush's relations have been especially bitter since Chirac actively led the opposition to the Iraq war, greeted Bush on Sunday and ushered him toward the waiting group of

other leaders standing on the hotel's

French officials said Chirac would use a one-on-one meeting with Bush on Monday to discuss the future of Iraq but not rehash past differences.

"I can't imagine that they would meet again without discussing the question of Iraq," Chirac spokeswoman Catherine Colonna told reporters. "But if they discuss it, it won't be to go back over the past. that would not be useful, but to look toward the future.'

Meanwhile, thousands of protesters blocked highways and bridges, set fire to barricades and

pellets Sunday from anti-riot police near the Group of Eight summit in the French town of Evian.

The most violent protests early Sunday were in the Swiss city Lausanne, across Lake Geneva from the G-8 summit site. Demonstrators wearing masks hurled rocks at police and a posh hotel and looted a gas station and a supermarket.

One protester was seriously hurt when he fell from a highway overpass. Lausanne police chief Eric Lehmann said the fall was an accident but demonstrators blamed

follow America's lead and pledge dramatic increases in support for the battle against AIDS. Before leaving on his European trip, Bush signed into law a US program that will provide \$15 billion to fight the disease over the next five years and said he hoped the action would prod other wealthy nations into similar

Crackdown on opposition 726 examinees by Myanmar junta

Seven top leaders under house arrest, all major party offices closed

Myanmar's ruling junta launched a crackdown on the democratic opposition yesterday, closing all major branch offices and putting its leadership under house arrest after detaining party figurehead Aung San Suu Kyi.

The Nobel peace laureate was placed under "protective custody" in northern Myanmar along with 18 members of her entourage after clashes between her supporters and a pro-junta mob Friday left four

dead and 50 injured, the govern-

A junta source said the seven members of the National League for Democracy (NLD) governing committee remaining in Yangon had been put under house arrest. The eighth, party vice-chairman Tin Oo, was in custody with Aung San Suu

"All the leadership of the NLD have been placed under house arrest since yesterday," the source told AFP. "All the NLD headquarters in major towns have been sealed, he said, adding that included seven or eight offices

Aung San Suu Kyi's whereabouts remained unknown and her party was barred from contacting her, but observers in Yangon said she may be on her way back to the
