#### Synthetic imports hurt iute carpet industry

The natural and environmentfriendly jute carpet has continuously been losing its share of local market to the imported synthetic floor coverings, industry sources said.

Out of the seven jute carpet factories, which were set up in early 1980s, only two are now in production. Once all those factories were in full production when jute carpets had a high demand in both local and export markets.

The total sales of jute carpets in Bangladesh during the early 1990s amounted to around Tk 1.5 crore per month. But for the last few years the sales of jute carpets and other local floor coverings (mats, area rugs, hand made carpets) dropped down to only Tk 30 lakh per month.

#### LPG company seeks duty free imports
