AL's 8-hour hartal today 4,000 law-enforcers on alert

The main opposition Awami League (AL) enforces a countrywide eighthour hartal from 6:00am to 2: 00pm today to protest lack of security in public life and the slide in law and order.

The strike, the second in a month called by the AL, coincides with tabling of the national budget in the parliament that will resume its session at 3.00pm this afternoon.

The AL called the last hartal on May 13 to protest the reinstatement of a convict in the Bangabandhu murder case and an accused in jail killing case in government service.

Salauddin Quader Chowdhury MP has sued the editors of The Daily Star and Prothom Alo for carrying out a report that was published in at least 12 other newspapers on June

Prime Minister's Parliamentary Affairs Adviser SQ Chowdhury filed the case accusing Awami League General Secretary Abdul Jalil of defamatory comments about him in a letter and the two editors for publishing the letter on June 3.

According to that report, Awami League had urged the government to cancel nomination of SQ Chowdhury from the run for the secretary general of the Organisation of Islamic Conference (OIC).

Major parties ignore EC registration rule

All major political parties are yet to apply for registration with the Election Commission (EC), two years after the enactment of a rule that requires the exercise to streamline general elections

But as the rule is not mandatory, all major parties including the Bangladesh Awami League, Bangladesh Nationalist Party and Jamaat-e-Islami, Bangladesh have not taken it seriously.

The EC laid down the law in July 2001 through a circulation a got applications from 29 parties, mostly fringe outfits.

Every police station has at least one civil team, the members of which move in plain clothes to find out and nab criminals.

"We have evidence that a nayek called Hannan minutes before the incident to alert him," a senior police officer said, requesting anonymity.

The Detective Branch of police (DB) in their probe found that Nayek Bellal allegedly alerted Hannan before the police team could hem in his den.

Bellal was picked up from in front of the Tejgaon Police Station a day after Humayun's killing and was sent to the Rajarbagh Police Lines.

"We're probing such links in the killings of DB-men at Malibagh and a police man at Azad cinema," a senior police official said.

"The culprits will not be allowed to go scot-free," a DB official stressed

About the necessity of civil police teams, a top official of Dhaka Metropolitan Police said they helped investigators contact criminals in investigation into criminal offences. "But they should be careful so that criminals could not use them as their plants in police," the

added. Humayun Kabir's death was the fourth police fatality in the capital in 20 days.

Suicide bombing kills 16 in Jerusalem after Israeli missile claims 6 in Gaza

A suspected Palestinian suicide bomber killed at least 16 people and injured more than 60 on a bus in Jerusalem yesterday, a day after an Israeli assassination attempt against a militant leader.

The blast, which tore through a bus near the city's main open-air market, was followed almost immediately by an Israeli missile strike on a car in Gaza in which witnesses said at least six people including a top Palestinian militant were killed.

Palestinian militants had threatened revenge attacks after Israel tried to kill Abdel-Aziz al-Rantissi, a leader of the radical Islamic group Hamas, in a helicopter missile strike in the Gaza Strip Tuesday.

US President Bush condemned the Jerusalem attack in the "strongest possible terms," the White House said.

The new cycle of bloodshed threatened to wreck a US-backed peace plan which was launched just

a week ago by Bush during talks with Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and Palestinian premier Mahmoud Abbas in Jordan.

The plan -- known as the "road map" -- had created a rare glimmer of hope after 32 months of Israeli-Palestinian violence.

"I heard the bomb and I came to help take people off," witness Benny Peretz said. "I opened the door and saw the terrorist's head on the ground."

Ambulances rushed to the area on the city's main Jaffa Road and medics pulled dead and wounded from the bus. The vehicle's windows were shattered and its roof partly blown off.

"It was a suicide bomber,' Jerusalem police chief Mickey Levy said. Police and medics said at least 16 people were killed and 65 people were injured.
