No growth possible without expanding tax net: Saifur

The proposed budget for fiscal 2003-2004 will contain inflation and lead to sustainable growth, needed to attain the millennium development goals (MDGs), said Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yester-

day.
"The aim of the proposed budget is to ensure growth by expanding the tax net to achieve MDGs that require a 7 per cent gross domestic product (GDP) growth to halve poverty by 2015," he said.

Without casting the tax net wide, attainment of sustainable growth is impossible, he said at a post-budget press briefing at the National Economic Council.

Education Minister Dr Osman Faruq, Agriculture Minister MK

Anwar, Commerce Minister Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury, State Minister for Aviation and Tourism Mir Md Nasiruddin, State Ministers for Finance and Planning Anwarul Kabir Talukdar and Shah M Abul Hussain were present.

Saifur said the proposed budget was a midcourse between external dependency and wide-ranging

The budget has a commitment to achieve macro-economic stability by making adequate allocations

and offering incentives to sectors like education, agriculture and export-oriented industries.

Powell arrives on June 19

US Secretary of State Colin Powell will visit Bangladesh on June 19 as part of his three-nation trip to Asia and the Middle East from June 16 to 23.

Powell will arrive in Dhaka after a two-day visit to Cambodia, according to a US State Department press notice released on June 12 and received in Dhaka yesterday.

US forces kill 97 Iraqis

Two big operations: Twin bomb attacks on oil pipeline

US troops killed 27 Iraqis who ambushed a tank patrol yesterday, after killing at least 70 at a guerrilla camp the day before, in the bloodiest clashes since President Bush declared major combat over.

The US military has launched two big operations west and north of Baghdad this week to try to root out what it says are diehard Saddam Hussein loyalists behind a recent spate of attacks on American troops in mainly Sunni Muslim areas.

A US statement said an organised group of fighters had fired

"The tanks returned fire, killing four of the attackers, and forcing the remainder to flee," it said. "Tanks and Bradley fighting vehicles reinforced with AH-64 Apache helicopters pursued the enemy personnel, killing 23 of the attackers.

No US casualties were reported in the clash.

Some 4,000 troops have been scouring an area around the Tigris river northeast of Balad since

Strike," which the military said was the biggest operation it had launched in the past six weeks.

In the other big assault, launched early on Thursday, at least 70 people were killed at a "terrorist" training camp in northwest Iraq, a US military spokesman said on Friday.

He said the 101st Airborne Division and special operations units were involved in the raid that began with an air strike on the camp, 90 miles northwest of Baghdad One US soldier was wounded. The

helicopter had been shot down during the operation on Thursday. The Apache's two-member crew were rescued unhurt as two other Apaches engaged irregular Iraqi fighters. It was the first time a US helicopter had been shot down since the fall of Baghdad on April 9.

The statement said 70 to 80 SAM-7 surface-to-air missiles, 75 to 78 rocket-propelled grenades and a score of AK-47 assault rifles had been found at the suspected train-

Mixed bag from chambers

The proposed budget for fiscal 2003-04 has sparked off mixed reaction among the business com-

While a number of chamber bodies and business associations lauded the increase in budgetary allocation for infrastructure development and tax exemption for the farm sector, many others found it improper that jute sector was 'ignored and income tax range was raised for bank directors

The Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MCCI) said the finance minister has quite rightly given emphasis on the development of infrastructure and human

It also lauded increased allocations for transport and communications, power and energy, education and technology.

In a statement, MCCI Acting President A Hafiz Choudhury said the development budget for 2003-04 is dependent on external sources to the extent of 51 per cent and therefore. any shortfall in foreign assistance will call for cuts in development expenditure, as in the current fiscal.

The Dhaka Chamber of Commerce & Industry (DCCI) said allocation for the improvement of law and order is inadequate.

The Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Industry (CCCI) hailed the proposed project for construction of the third bridge over the Karnaphuli river. Tax exemptions for poultry,

fisheries and livestock will give impetus to farm sector, President of the chamber Amir Humayun Mahmud Chowdhury said in a

But it is not appropriate to increase the range of income tax of listed banks and insurance companies, he thought. Faridpur Chamber of Commerce

and Industry (FCCI) said the proposed budget did not mention anything about the pre-shipment inspection (PSI) system although importers were being harassed for a long time. Bangladesh Frozen Foods

Exporters Association said the budget reflects the intention to establish good governance and improve of law and order. "The incentives for agro-based

industry and the allocations for education, health and communication sectors will have a positive impact on the economy," said a statement issued by President of the association Quazi Monirul

The proposed budget for the fiscal 2003-04 failed to design any illustrative plan for poverty reduction, said Executive Director of the Centre for Policy Dialogue Debapriya Bhattacharya yesterday.

Although the new budget closely followed the mid-term macroeconomic framework agreed under the Interim-Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (I-PRSP), a poverty reduction recipe of the World Bank, it did not give any clear indication of reducing poverty, Debapriya and his team told a press briefing on initial

Seven fishing trawlers with 84 crew on board have gone missing in the Bay of Bengal and all efforts to trace them for the last three days have Sources said three rescue teams

According to the Fishing Trawlers' Owners Association of Patharghata, over 100 trawlers on June 9 set out for the deep sea from Patharghata to catch hilsha fish. But all except the seven trawlers returned to shore after three tornadoes swept the coastal areas on June 10 and 11.

Relatives of the missing fishermen have crowded the Association office but there hasn't been any word from the search and rescue teams, said association president Golam Mostafa



In a surprise move, the proposed budget for the fiscal 2003-2004 has raised duty on a raft of defence items of which the government is the sole

The step will require 15 per cent higher government spending on bombs, grenades torpedoes, mines, missiles and some other arms, ammunition and supplies. As the government is the lone

buyer of the goods, the duty hike will offer higher pots of profit to a small group of 'privileged importers', some said, taking a swipe at the proposals.

The budget, placed by Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman in the Jatiya Sangsad on Thursday, also proposed higher duty on a range of items including essentials. It suggests tax measures which

will see increase in the prices of

powdered milk, butter and other fats,

cheese and curd, dates, fresh and

dried mangoes, oranges, lemons, grapes, apples, refined coconut oil and sugar.

It will also raise the prices of sweet biscuits, waffles and wafers, soya sauce, tomato ketchup and similar goods, soft drinks, non-alcoholic beer, cigar, cheroots and cigarillo salt. Portland cement, fly ash, soap noodles, paints and varnish. Prices of matches, baths, shower

baths and basins, particle boards, fibre boards and ply-wood, carpet and floor covering mats, cotton, Tshirt, trousers, sports footwear and rubber will also rise.

Plastic, leather, marble stone, glass mirrors, bicycle chains and parts, sanitarywares, fan and fan parts, air-conditioners, refrigerators dry cell battery, radio cassette players, colour televisions and twostroke motor cycles will also go
