Tigers fly down

There can be no bigger challenge for Bangladesh when Khaled Mahmud's men set off for Australia today to play two Tests and three one-day internationals.

The maiden tour down under will also be an acid test for Bangladesh's new coach Dav Whatmore, who knows better than anybody else that how forbidding Australia can be.

The all-conquering Australians have already confirmed that they are not considering the tour of the modest South Asian nation as a charity and announced a fullstrength side to be drawn at two new venues in Darwin and Cairns.

Although Whatmore put on a brave face in Friday's press briefing

Since gaining Test status in June 2000, Bangladesh have been the punch-bag, losing 18 of their 19 previous Tests with the other being drawn thanks to rain.

Alarmed by the dismal performances of the Tigers new ICC president Ehsan Mani warned that their overseas tours would be curtailed in the future.

The statement comes only days after the ruling body's cricket committee advised that Bangladesh would have to go through a certain qualifying procedure with Zimbabwe and Kenya to earn a place in the Champions Trophy in England next vear.

There was more bad news at home when Emirates declined to be the team's official sponsor.

The number one sport in the country suffered a body blow in the aftermath of the World Cup debacle in South Africa, where they lost five of their six first round matches including a shock defeat against minnows Canada.

The debacle in South Africa prompted the Board to form an inquiry committee and the findings of the two-member body rocked the establishment.

But the Board tried to restore order by bringing Whatmore after sacking former Pakistan paceman Mohsin Kamal.

ICC to hand over **WC** money

England, New Zealand and Sri Lanka will all receive part of the money withheld by the International Cricket Council (ICC) for World Cup contract infringements, the governing body said in a statement Friday.

But India's World Cup payment, estimated at between 8 to 9 million dollars for all major cricket nations, is to be withheld. India's players refused to sign

the standard tournament contracts because they were unwilling to surrender control of their personal endorsement and image rights. India was, and remains, a major

commercial market for all the official World Cup backers and, by extension, tournament broadcasting and sponsorship rights holders Global Cricket Corporation (GCC), who are taking action against the ICC. Findland and New Zealand

penalised for refusing to play World Cup matches in Zimbabwe and

Kenya respectively on safety

Meanwhile Sri Lanka had money withheld after they missed the ICC deadline for returning signed player contracts.

Drawing a line between right and wrong

The fine line between right and wrong in umpiring decisions could become a little thicker thanks to the International Cricket Council. Lbw decisions could be made

much easier for umpires when parallel painted white lines on pitches are tested - possibly as early as October. It is the latest radical plan from

the ICC in its ongoing drive to minimise the margin of error. Television audiences have

become well-versed in the intricacies of Ibw laws in the advent of virtual reality lines superimposed onto instant replays. Like umpires, they know a

batsman cannot be given out if a ball pitches outside leg-stump or if he is struck on the pads outside the line of off-stump. But now it is the umpires themselves who will be given the luxury, and who resultantly will have less

to fall back on when they make a

"We haven't decided whether to use an unbroken or dotted white line, but this is an experiment worth introducing," said David Richardson, the ICC's cricket manager. The thought of turning 22 yards of sacrosanct turf into something resembling a train track will be abhorrent to some. But, rest assured, the ICC will
