The ACC has approved a grant of 500,000 dollars to Bangladesh for the development of their cricket. The money will be given from the share of the four full members of the ACC," said Syed Ashraful Huq during a press briefing at a local hotel yesterday.

The chief executive of the ACC also said that both the International Cricket Council (ICC) and the ACC would monitor those projects.
