BB asks banks make financial statements transparent

BSS, Dhaka

The Bangladesh Bank (BB) has asked the commercial banks to make their financial statements more comprehensive and informative as per the international banking

In a press release, BB yesterday justified the move by saying it is essential in order to provide depositors, investors and other stakeholders an exact, clear and trans-parent impression about the financial condition of a bank.

The central bank said each bank should hang a brief statement about the bank's position in a visible form in each of its branches. It should include the bank's total deposit. loans, advances, classified loans, SEE PAGE 11 COL 8

Govt studies UN resolution on sending troops

FM says country has to go by global concensus

Bangladesh is studying a UN Security Council resolution on sending troops to war-torn Iraq and in touch with governments of other UN member states for the issue, said Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan yesterday.

"We're studying the chapter four

of the UNSC resolution 1483 to see how it covers sending troops as stabilisation force to Iraq," he told the news agency

The chapter four of the UNSC resolution urges the member states

. "We have to go by global consensus," Khan said. Bangladesh never

sent any combatant force to fight against any nation, he added.

About US Secretary of State Colin Powell's request, the minister said Powell has requested "us to see" in what way Bangladesh could send troops as stabilisation force.

Khan said Bangladesh has so far joined 28 peacekeeping missions SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

Pubali Bank's looted booty found, army man arrested

The probe into the sensational theft at the Pubali Bank branch at Bangabandhu Avenue in the city made a headway yesterday with police recovering Tk 12.40 lakh and gold ornaments weighing half a

Tk 12 lakh and gold ornaments were recovered in Khulna while Tk 40,000 was recovered from an army man in Dhaka and he was arrested.

A security guard at the bank, Abu Daud Sheikh, had allegedly stolen Tk 26.62 lakh in cash and prize bond and gold ornaments by breaking open the bank's strong room sometime

between June 13 and 14 nights (Thursday and Friday). The incident came to light on June 14 when the bank reopened after the weekend.

In Khulna, a team from the city's Motijheel Police Station yesterday raided the house of a close relative of Abu Daud at Gilatola and seized Tk 12

akh along with the gold ornaments. Police arrested Abu Daud's brother-in-law Abul Bashar, a corporal of the army intelligence, in this connection and recovered Tk 40,000 from his possession at Sector-8 of Uttara

The bank guard is still absconding.

3 ex-bankers, CIP jailed for fund embezzlement

Three former officials of the Janata Bank were sentenced to 15-year rigorous imprisonment yesterday for misappropriating funds.

The convicts in two separate cases are former manager Mohammad Saifullah Siddiqi, second officer Badaruddin Biswas and cashier Mujibur Rahman of the bank's Fakirerpool branch.

They were also fined Tk 15 lakh or to suffer two more years behind bars.

'Angry civilians killed six British troops'

80 Iraqis may also have died in firefight: The Independent

Six British soldiers killed on Tuesday were shot dead by Iraqi civilians angry at intrusive searches for weapons in a conservative Shi'ite Muslim town in southern Iraq, residents said yesterday.

The British government said six soldiers were killed and eight wounded in two separate incidents on Tuesday near the city of Amarah,

some 200 km north of Iraq's Britishcontrolled second city, Basra. Witnesses in the town of Majjar

30 km south of Amarah, said the six were killed by residents after days of tension because of methods a British force used to search for heavy weapons.

At least two Iraqis died in Tuesday's clash at Majjar, residents said, adding that the British opened fire with plastic bullets to control a crowd after days of tension. There was no immediate com-

ment from the British military on the

"These British soldiers came with their dogs and pointed weapons at women and children. As Muslims, we can't accept dogs at homes.
