

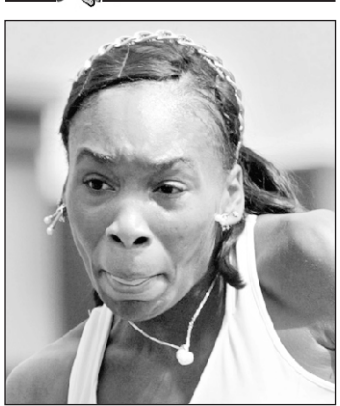

### King new Indian physical trainer

South African Gregory Allen King has been named the new physical trainer of the Indian cricket team, a top official announced here on Friday.

Indian cricket chief Jagmohan Dalmiya said King would begin his assignment from August 1.

The 30-year-old King replaces compatriot Adrian Le Roux, who resigned early this month to work for the South African team.

King, a conditioning specialist for fast bowlers and fielding coach with South African provincial side Border, is expected to be given a one-year contract.

India's next Test series is against New Zealand at home in October.

# Kapali star of the day



A fine all-round performance by teenager Alok Kapali helped put Bangladesh in control of their tour match against the Queensland Academy of Sport on Saturday.

Kapali top-scored for Bangladesh, hitting six fours and a six in a spunky 55. Then, he caused plenty of damage with his leg-spinners, running through Queensland's middle-order to return figures of 4 for 24 as the visitors looked to start their tour of Australia with a win.

Resuming at 86 for three, Bangladesh snuck past the Academy's first innings of 201 before declaring at 203 for nine.

Bangladesh were quickly reduced to 112 to 6, with James Hopes' medium-pace doing most of the damage.

He snared the first two wickets of the day, dismissing Al Shahriar (4) and Mohammad Ashraful (39).

When Damien MacKenzie, right-arm fast-medium bowler, dismissed Sanwar Hossain for 6, a Bangladesh lead looked unlikely, but Kapali and Khaled Mashud, the

wicketkeeper, stitched together a 60-run partnership for the seventh wicket which put the innings back on track.

Kapali was finally dismissed by Hopes, who finished with figures of 4 for 35.

When stumps were drawn on the second of three, the Academy were 153-7 in their second innings, leading by 151 with just three wickets in hand.

The academy made a strong start to their second innings when Daniel Payne and Brendan Nash put on 54 for the opening wicket before Kapali struck with the ball.

The duo saw off Bangladesh's new-ball attack but the problems for the home team began soon after. Despite a spirited 52 from Daniel Payne, the right-handed opener, Queensland lost wickets at regular intervals.

Kapali grabbed four wickets with his leg-spinners as the locals lost six wickets for 86 runs with only Payne (52) showing any sustained resistance.

Kapali ripped through the middle-order, and among his victims was Nathan Hauritz (9) and Payne.

The eighth-wicket pair of MacKenzie and Lee Carseldine saw off the last six overs, but Bangladesh still had reason to be

pleased. If their batsmen keep their wits about them, Bangladesh could well make a winning start to their Australian tour.

Bangladesh are touring Australia for the first time and will play two

# Century for Kallis



Jacques Kallis scored 107 and shared a century stand with Mark Boucher as South Africa closed on 264 for six against England in their one-day triangular NatWest Series match at The Oval on Saturday.

Kallis helped rebuild the innings during a 111-run partnership with Boucher (55 off 65 balls) after England's front-line seamers had reduced them to 72 for three in the 19th over.

Kallis, who passed 6,000 one-day runs during his innings, drove majestically throughout before all-rounder Andrew Flintoff yorked him in the penultimate over.

The right-handed batsman, who hit 12 fours, immediately dedicated his innings to his father, who has just been diagnosed with cancer.

Kallis, wearing the number 65 on his shirt to reflect his father's age, said: "It was pretty emotional. We're

fighting with him. I did deliberate whether to come on tour but he is being well looked after by the family."

Flintoff ended with three for 46, all his victims bowled by block-hole deliveries.

England, fielding a side strong on bowling but weak on batting after skipper Michael Vaughan was forced out with back spasms minutes before the start, had begun well.

Fast bowler James Anderson removed both openers cheaply, Herschelle Gibbs the first to go for five when his stumps were shattered as he failed to get forward.

Skipper Graeme Smith, after several attractive back-foot forces, then departed for 15 with the score on 38. Cramped up attempting a cut, he dragged Anderson's delivery into his stumps.

First-change seamer Richard Johnson seemed to put England in charge when he picked up off his own bowling following a Kallis block, turned and spectacularly threw

down the wicket at the non-striker's end to run out Jacques Rudolph.

But Kallis and Boucher regained the initiative, beginning cautiously before opening out against left-arm spinner Ashley Giles' defensive leg-stump line.

Boucher rode his luck and would have been run out on 11 and 12 by direct hits, but he proved a perfect foil for Kallis' ninth one-day century.

The pair took South Africa to 183 for three with 10 overs remaining but Flintoff spreadeagled Boucher's stumps next ball.

Martin van Jaarsveld and Kallis followed in identical fashion before a dramatic final over. Darren Gough, whose first five overs had cost 12 runs, was hit for five fours in a row by Andrew Hall to finish with 10 overs for 61.

# Hockey horror how long?

The League Committee of Bangladesh Hockey Federation (BFH) will sit on Monday to solve a familiar issue that local hockey has experienced many a time.

Although beating of umpires is one of the most dreadful things that one can expect to happen on the field, this heinous act is something our umpires have learned to live with.

The recent assault on umpire Golam Kibria during the Club Cup final between Mohammedan Sporting Club and Abahani Kirira Chakra was an instance of how insecure the officials have become in our country.

Kibria was running for his life after a group of aggrieved Abahani players led by none other than their beloved coach Jummon Lusai chased him and menacingly wielding the hockey stick. The offence of Kibria was that he awarded a penalty corner against the popular Dhanmondi outfit at the last minute of the blood and thunder clash.

He would have escaped with the ruling had not Mohammedan scored

the winner from the resultant short corner.

It was not that the Abahani players mercilessly beat Kibria in front of thousands at the Maulana Bhasani National Stadium, but the ugly scenes happened right in front of the State Minister for Youth and Sports Fazlur Rahman and BHF president Air Vice Marshall Fakhru Azam.

But two days after that black episode the officials were discussing more on to justify the ruling of the umpire rather than trying to work out a formula to rid hooliganism once and for all.

The tournament committee secretary Nurul Amin has confirmed that both the umpires and the match commissioner, whose name was not known, have submitted their reports. He also said that the culprits would be punished.

But past records reflected an altogether different story.

Four years ago during the semi-final of the first edition of the Club Cup another umpire Monwarul Islam was mercilessly beaten by Mariner players and officials. Unfortunately the culprits escaped

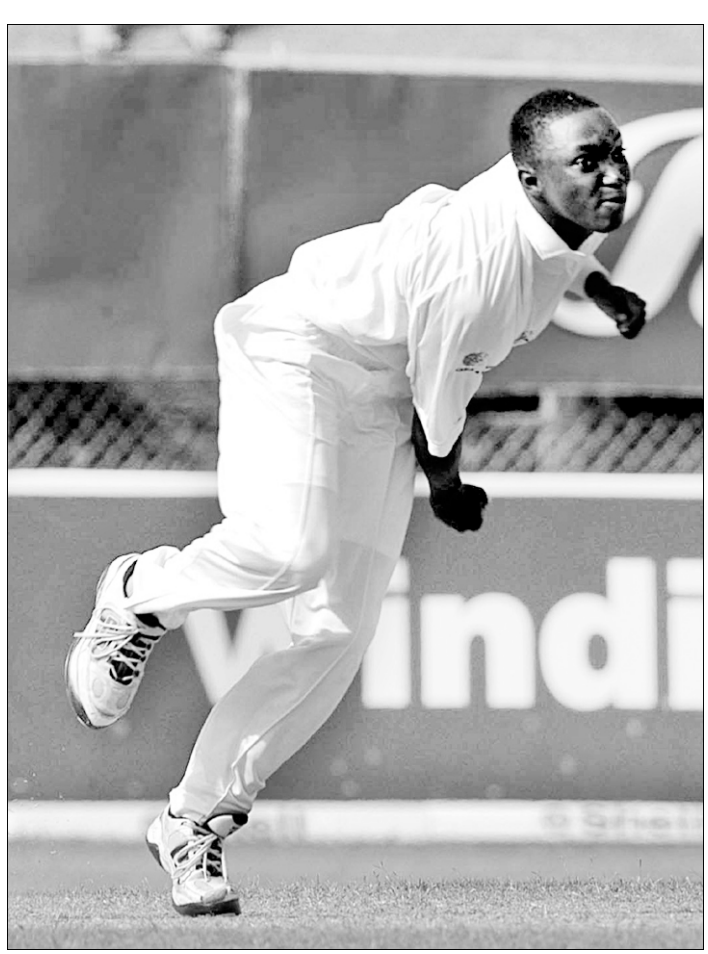

# Sombre Confeds final

Sunday's Confederations Cup final between France and Cameroon will be like no other, an occasion laced with poignancy being held in the shadow of the sudden death of Marc Vivien Foe.

To acknowledge Thursday's tragedy in Lyon, the match at the Stade de France here will be stripped of all the razzmatazz and spectacle that normally accompanies such an event, leaving just the football to act as a tribute to the 28-year-old Cameroon international.

"Everything that's not football, like the closing ceremony, has been cancelled," said Chuck Blazer,

president of FIFA's competitions organising commission.

FIFA said the best way to mark Foe's death after his collapse in the 72nd minute of the semi against Colombia was to stage a final imbued with "great dignity".

French skipper Marcel Desailly was not alone among Les Bleus in questioning whether the match should go ahead at all but Roger Milla, Cameroon's 1990 World Cup star, explained: "We had a meeting with the players and directors and decided to go ahead and play in his honour."

Quite how the Indomitable Lions and their Gallic counterparts will cope with the challenge facing them is impossible to say but a recent precedent, when Michael Schumacher won the San Marino Grand Prix only hours after the death of his mother, suggests that for 90 minutes at least they will place grief to one side and concentrate on the job in hand.

France's Manchester United defender Mikael Sylvestre suggested a fitting outcome would be to

have "two winners".

"That's a possibility that doesn't displease me," he said.

"It's a final where the match takes secondary importance," he continued.

"We'll all need lots of courage, but the game will be for Foe."

The mourning Cameroon squad made the trip up from Lyon, where they beat Colombia 1-0 to their new HQ in the suburbs of Paris on Friday, electing to stay behind closed doors and forgo the chance to hold a public training session.

The African and Olympic champions have asked and been granted special permission to carry the name of their dead teammate on their shirts.

Cameroon, who drew 1-1 in their only previous encounter with the hosts, would not have been on everyone's shortlist to make the final after their first round exit from the World Cup last summer.

Yet under German coach Winfried Schafer they stunned World Cup winners Brazil and third-

# Agassi stays on course

Second seed and former champion Andre Agassi of the United States moved into the fourth round of the men's singles at Wimbledon on Saturday with a 5-7, 6-4, 7-6 (7/4), 7-6 (7/4) win in 3hr 13min over Moroccan 27th seed Younes El Aynaoui.

Agassi next meets Australian big-hitter Mark Philippoussis after seeing off El Aynaoui for the fifth time in as many meetings.

The Las Vegas, titlist here for his first Major crown in 1992, saved one break point in the 11th game but the Moroccan nailed the break when the Las Vegas hit long following a superb piece of retrieval from his rival, a high return landing plum on the baseline.

An Agassi crosscourt backhand long gave El Aynaoui, a fellow veteran at 31, two set points and a huge serve clinched it.

In the second set Agassi missed a break point in the fourth game but broke at the first time of asking in the tenth game to level the contest as the pendulum swung inexorably towards the 33-year-old.

In the third set Agassi repeatedly came to the net but was getting little change out of the Moroccan serve, an ace from the challenger allowing him to hold at 6-6.

But in the ensuing tiebreak a controversial line call moved Agassi 4-1 clear and the former champion, playing Wimbledon for the 13th time, moved two sets to one clear with a superlative backhand.

Still El Aynaoui kept on fighting - as befitted a man who took US young gun Andy Roddick to 21-19 in

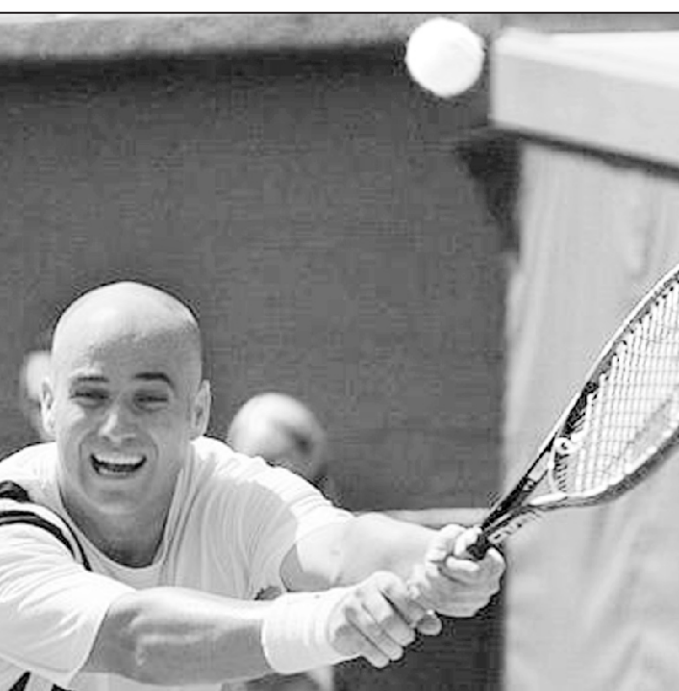
