placed Turkey and drew 0-0 with the United States before seeing off Colombia.
Striker Samuel Eto'o, lining up for his club Real Mallorca in the Spanish Cup final on Saturday, could well make a quick reappearance 24 hours later for his country at the Stade de France.
FIFA reported that there was nothing in the rules to stop Eto'o, scorer of the decisive goal against Brazil, from taking part in two games so close together.
France have led a charmed life since the start of this competition, being awarded a dubious penalty in their opener against Colombia, and then being let off the hook when Yokan Yilmaz squandered a spot kick in the final minutes of Thursday's semi-final win against Turkey.
In winning that 3-2 the European champions produced some fine football, with the goals coming from Arsenal trio Thierry Henry, Robert Pires and Sylvain Wittord.
And all this without the talismanic Zinedine Zidane.
"The puzzle is to build ourselves without 'Zizou', it's important for the confidence," noted coach Jacques Santini, terribly moved by the passing of the player he had managed at Lyon.
This will be the last Confederations Cup final, for the next edition in 2005 has been renamed the Marc Vivien Foe Trophy.

'Change rules against us'

Australia Test captain Steve Waugh reckons that his side have become so dominant in international cricket that administrators might want to think about changing the rules to make rival countries more competitive.
"Our job is to do the best we can for Australia. The West Indies teams of the 1980s almost made administrators change the rules so other nations could compete," said Waugh, as quoted in the Sydney Morning Herald.
"That's been one of our goals for us to make rules change so others can compete."
Speaking at a state Chamber of Commerce luncheon, Waugh revealed that he took his own brutal outlook on international cricket from that very West Indian team.
"Any of our players were almost scared of West Indies," he said. "I remember at one point thinking this

game is too hard. It took me 13 Tests to be part of a winning side.
"I remember sitting in the dressing room at Eden Park in New Zealand," continued Waugh. "We had just lost, and I looked around at everyone with their heads bowed. And I was thinking, 'This is too

tough. Do I really want to do this? That was an important moment"
Waugh talked about his first first-

class match for New South Wales, and rooming with Imran Khan.
"I became very good at answering the phone," Waugh joked. "I was pretty shy in those days. [Imran] had a big reputation for a lot of things. I was that intimidated by him I just kept quiet and answered the phone."
Waugh also hinted at a muted support of Australia's sledging tactics, and although he said that he was against "saying something directly against someone," he was happy to "put doubt in the batsman's mind. I'm all for that."
"For example, if Shane Warne's bowling into the rough outside the batsman's legs and he's trying to sweep, the guy at short leg might say 'Can you believe this guy's trying to sweep Warne out of the rough?' and the player on the other side at bat-pad might say 'Obviously these guys don't have a TV in their rooms they've got no idea what's going on,'" said Waugh. "If we can get the batsman in some doubt, that's fair enough."

Let Gibbs play freely

Former South Africa opening batsman Barry Richards believes Herschelle Gibbs should be allowed to play his natural game during South Africa's current tour of England.
The opener should not be burdened with game plans, tactics and unnecessary responsibilities, says Richards in a column in the Daily Telegraph.
"Gibbs at his best is a match-winner, but he tends to lose concentration when his team needs him most. The team management should allow him to do his own thing.
"He plays on instinct, something which is not always to everyone's liking," says Richards, one of the stars of the South African series win over the Australians in 1970.
He says every time it appears as if Gibbs has reached maturity, something happens which makes one wonder whether he will ever wear the mantle of motivator and leader in the team.
Richards says South Africa's 22-year-old captain Graeme Smith has

a "refreshing, honest way with the media." However, his big challenge will be the Test matches against England. "He's very confident, but if there's life in the pitch, his technique is suspect."
He also believes Gary Kirsten will have to bat lower down the order to accommodate Smith as opener.
Jacques Rudolph, Martin van Jaarsveld and Boeta Dippenaar should play important supporting roles, but there is a question mark behind Dippenaar's name.
Richards says the middle-order batsman is "too decent" on the field and players like him are targeted by the opposition.
"Maybe he should stiffen his back a bit on this tour," says Richards, who also believes Jacques Kallis, whose batting ability is not in doubt, can play a big role on tour as bowler, should he regain the ability to swing the ball away from the night-handers.
"This English summer could determine the future of South African cricket for a few years to come," says Richards, who scored about 28 000 first-class runs between 1964 and 1983.

He then suffered a combination of shoulder, calf and knee problems, the latter requiring an operation, which ruled him out of the majority of England's pre-World Cup one-day series in Australia.

Glamorgan's first choice after they learned that James' knee injury is career-threatening and requires surgery.
Australian Mike Kasprovic is currently the club's sole overseas player, leaving the way open for 29-year-old Maher, who will not play for Australia against Bangladesh, to make himself available for the rest of the summer.
Glamorgan chief executive Mike Fatkin said: "We are generally against the principle of too many overseas players and EU passport holders but we have had to be pragmatic about it.
"Steve (James) is a massive influence and we have struggled without him. He is undergoing major reconstructive surgery and we will have to wait to see if he can return next year.
"We have just had to look at the short term. Jimmy Maher has been here before, we know what we are getting and there is no problem with him.
"We wanted to see if he was going to be in the Australia squad to play Bangladesh first, but as he isn't we decided to sign him."

Suspect security

Security at this year's Wimbledon Tennis Championships is under the spotlight after a tabloid newspaper reporter bluffed his way into a job guarding the world's top tennis stars, including defending women's champion Serena Williams.
A British newspaper reporter applied for a job at the tournament through the official tournament website, providing false references and a fake CV.
For his first day in the job he guarded championship favourite Serena and then looked after her sister Venus, world No 1 Andre Agassi and Wimbledon fifth seed Andy Roddick as well as outgoing men's champion Lleyton Hewitt.
Both Serena and Venus have reportedly been the targets of stalkers and ten years ago, Monica Seles was stabbed on court.
Wimbledon bosses have previously declared this year's security to be the tightest ever.
The Daily Mirror pictured its reporter standing next to Hewitt, as well as young stars Jelena Dokic and Daniela Hantuchova.
Labour MP Tom Watson called for an immediate probe into safety at Wimbledon.
"It's outrageous security at Britain's No 1 sporting event could be breached so easily," said Watson.

The Mirror quoted the head of Securicor, Ken Wood, as saying prior to the tournament that "security has been transformed since Seles."

A spokesman for Securicor, the firm charged with overall security at the event, said: "We take any security breach very seriously and will conduct a thorough review of all our operations to ascertain how this person came to be employed this year."

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American power

Andy Roddick and Venus Williams had the Stars and Stripes flying proudly over Centre Court as the two Americans powered into the fourth round at Wimbledon on Friday.
Barely an hour after Roddick had

Roddick was in bullish mood after his third straight sets victory of the tournament, a 7-6 (7/5), 6-4, 6-3 dismissal of Spanish clay-courter Tommy Robredo.
"I'm starting to believe myself and I'm definitely here to win this tournament," the 20-year-old Nebraskan declared.
Despite his current form, and the fact that he had never lost to

After having to battle through five sets in his first two matches, Asia's top male player hit the ground running against the Spanish left-hander, securing a break in the first game of the match.
He then went on to complete a 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 win to the delight of the numerous Thai fans who had managed to get hold of tickets for the number one showcourt.
Paradorn, who beat Andre Agassi here last year, admitted that Roddick was in intimidating form. "His game is suited to grass so it will be a tough one," he said.
Fourth seed Roger Federer reached the last 16 with a 6-3, 6-1, 4-6, 6-1 win over fast-rising American Mardy Fish. The Swiss player will take on Spain's Feliciano Lopez for a place in the quarterfinals.
Croatia's Ivo Karlovic, conqueror of defending champion Lleyton Hewitt in the first round, lost his battle of the giants with Max Mirnyi.
In probably the tallest ever match at the championships, 1m 96 (6'5") Belarus doubles master Mirnyi defeated the 2m08 (6'10") Croat 7-6 (7/5), 3-6, 6-3, 7-6 (7/4) to set up a fourth round tie with Swede Jonas Bjorkman.
Despite the defeat, Karlovic left Wimbledon with a huge smile on his face.
"It's been an unbelievable experience for me to play on Centre Court against Lleyton Hewitt, and to win. I beat the number one, so I'm happy."
Sjeng Schalken proved there is still life in Dutch tennis following the injury-enforced retirement of Richard Krajicek when he became the first man into the last 16 of the men's singles.
The Dutch eighth seed, a quarter-finalist here last year, cruised to a 6-2, 6-4, 7-6 (7/3) win over Romanian Victor Hanescu, a lucky loser from the qualifying tournament.
Schalken now plays ninth seed Rainer Schuettler, who finally killed off the dogged resistance of American Todd Martin 4-6, 7-5, 6-7 (1/7), 6-1, 7-5.
In the women's singles, Venus Williams was joined in the last 16 by Kim Clijsters and Lindsay Davenport, both of whom face Japanese opponents in the next round.
Clijsters will take on her doubles partner, Ai Sugiyama. The Japanese number one equalled her best performance at Wimbledon by advancing to the fourth round with a straight sets victory over Nathalie Dechy of France.
Shinobu Asagoe had never been beyond the second round of any Grand Slam before but, after eliminating ninth seed Daniela Hantuchova in the last round, she continued her progress with a 7-5, 6-2 win over Francesca Schiavone of Italy.
