# Bangladesh bounce back

Bangladesh set themselves up for

the daunting task of a Test series against Australia with a thrilling victory over Australia's Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy on Saturday in Brisbane. They brought off a morale-

boosting two-wicket win in the second match of their Australian cricket tour. Set 230 to win from a maximum of 73 overs, Bangladesh got home with two wickets and six balls to spare on the third and final day at Allan Border Field.

Captain Khaled Mahmud clinched a tense victory with an ondrive for four after some nervous moments in the final session.

Bangladesh started poorly, with Mark Cleary nipping out both Javed Omar and Habibul Bashar early in the innings and they were 113 for four at tea with 35 overs remaining but lost wickets at regular intervals.

But Mohammad Ashraful anchored the innings with a classy 61, while Alok Kapali chipped in with a pugnacious 44. But it was the two senior men, the Khaleds

Mashud and Mahmud who did the damage late on with some adventurous shot-making.

When Ashraful, who hit eight fours and two sixes, was dismissed the tourists were still needing 96 and five wickets left.

All-rounder Kapali and wicketkeeper Mashud, who made 28, then put on 43 for the sixth-wicket with Kapali and Mahmud, also scoring 28, adding another 34 for the seventh.

Medium-pacer Peter Worthington (3-31 off 12 overs) gave the Academy renewed hope when he dismissed Mashrafeebin-Mortuza (1) with six needed, but Mahmud steered his side

Bangladesh coach Dav Whatmore said his team's performance was a definite improvement on last week's 29-run loss to a Queensland Academy of Sport invitation team at the same

"But there's still glaring areas to improve on," Whatmore said.

"Generally speaking, we batted better and there were some encouraging signs and I thought we bowled okay in patches.

"We fielded alright, the ground fielding was a lot better so things are starting to go in the right direc-

Whatmore said his players needed to concentrate on finishing off the job properly in their fourday game against a Northern Territory Chief Minister's team

starting in Darwin on Thursday, their final match before the first Test begins on July 18 in Darwin.

Academy captain Aaron Nye (89 not out) declared his team's second innings at 203 for four before lunch after extending his overnight stand with Callum Ferguson (48

The Academy side, which included five players with senior interstate experience, lost only seven wickets in the match, compared to Bangladesh's 15.

"It's unusual you lose a game of cricket when you bat, bowl and field better," Academy coach Bennett King said.

Although he felt Bangladesh lacked a world-class bowler and batsman to build its side around, King said they would be competiagainst Australia from exuberance side" and felt they showed a lot of energy and passion.

## Heath goes to the rescue

Zimbabwe captain Heath Streak hit a defiant half-century to help his side South Africa in their one-day triangular series match on Saturday.

Streak struck some lusty blows including six fours and a six, in his 72ball 54 as Zimbabwe limped to 174 for eight from 50 overs after being asked to bat first at Sophia Gardens.

South Africa's bowlers, who shared the wickets around, had taken control before Streak's late hitting breathed new life into the

Makhaya Ntini made the initial reakthrough, Douglas Marillier mis-timing a pull to square leg with the score on 11, but it was his newpartner Shaun Pollock who checked Zimbabwe's early progress.

Former captain Pollock found plenty of bounce from just short of a length and, although his opening spell did not yield a wicket, he conceded just eight runs from seven impressive overs, including three

Travis Friend (12) and Dion Ebrahim (20) threatened a recovery

of sorts before the pair fell in quick succession, the latter falling to Jacques Kallis, who had dropped the opener at second slip in the fourth over of the day.

Recalled left-arm spinner Paul Adams then accounted for Tatenda Taibu (19) with a ball that straightened to trap him leg before.

Stuart Matsikenyeri fell cheaply after flicking carelessly to square leg and, when Grant Flower (26) dragged on to give Andrew Hall a second quick wicket, Zimbabwe were strugngat92 for six.

Ervine then joined Streak to add a useful 52 runs in 11 overs for the seventh wicket, before the Zimbabwe captain brought up his 50 with a thumping six over extra cover

But Kallis took revenge by yorking Streak in the 48th over, his third wicket of the innings.

South Africa, who lead the series standings after beating England by seven wickets at Old Trafford on Thursday, need to win one more game to reach the final.

Rohan Gavaskar scored a majestic century as India A cruised to a seven-wicket victory against Nottinghamshire at Trent Bridge on Friday.

There had been little prospect of a result after rain washed out the whole of Thursday's play, but a captain's agreement secured India a target of 340, after both sides forfeited an innings. It was achieved in grand style, as Gavaskar cracked four sixes and 17 fours in his 139 from 181 balls.

India stuttered at first Charles Shreck bowled Wasim Jaffer for 0, and Andy Harris followed up with the wicket of Shiv Sunder Das. But Gavaskar shared in a third-wicket stand of 148 with Satyajit Parab, who made 90 from 108 balls before being bowled by Daniel Vettori (169 for 3), then guided India home in the company of Ambati Rayadu (71 not out).

Nottinghamshire had earlier declared on 339 for 5, with Usman Afzaal carrying his first-day century into a superb unbeaten 161. Gareth Clough (55) gave him excellent support in a fourth-wicket partnership of 160.

While Venus, the 2000 and 2001 champion, established early dominance by winning the first three meetings of an on-court rivalry which neither player enjoys, Serena has now won their last six meetings.

On every occasion, the sister winning the first set had gone on to triumph - and Venus, taken to three sets in both her quarter-final and semi, looked set fair after racing 3-0 clear with a break to love and notching 11 straight points.

But Serena saved four break points in the fourth game as she held for 1-3 and Venus then saw her first serve desert her with Serena breaking, then holding to love for 3-3 - before Venus held after saving two break points.

A double fault from Serena in the tenth game, a missed overhead and then an unsuccessful drop shot moved Venus, who defied medical advice not to play the French Open a month ago, a set clear in 43min.

The India star batsman had the peration to repair a bone injury at e base of his left ring finger, which had been troubling him since the end of 2002.

"I am fully fit now and I am very much looking forward to the New Tendulkar told reporters on Saturday.

Tendulkar, who has been troubled by a series of wear-and-tear injuries in the last few years, had been expected to undergo rehabilitation for over four months following his surgery, but said he felt no

A foot injury sidelined him for the 2001 tour of Sri Lanka and an ankle injury during the December-January series in New Zealand kept him out of five one-dayers.

Despite his protracted hand problem, he scored 673 runs at an average of 61.18 to be named player of the World Cup earlier this year, but was then forced to pull out of a one-day tri-series in Dhaka India's next major engagement

## Chance to be champ WIMBLEDON

With Australian serve machine Mark Philippoussis standing in the way of sizzling Swiss star Roger Federer the Wimbledon men's singles final will be marked by an intriguing clash of styles as both men chase their first Grand Slam crown.

Federer, the artiste, turned in a performance of such brilliance in seeing off semifinal rival Andy Roddick, the US fifth seed, in straight sets that it is hard to believe he can maintain the same level across Sunday's trophy match.

The bandana-clad 21-year-old from Basle has been waiting to claim the mantle of king of Wimbledon ever since he roasted Pete Sampras on Centre Court two years ago in the fourth round and now looks the real deal for the future of the men's game.

At 19 years of age the challenge came too early against Sampras and Tim Henman knocked him out in the Two years on, however, it seems

little can stop Federer becoming the first Swiss champion at the All England Club after he crushed



Roddick 7-6 (8/6), 6-3, 6-3 Yet Philippoussis, though he may

be only ranked 48 to four for Federer, has two distinct advantages as the duo prepare to face off on the most famous Centre Court in the world.

The 26-year-old from Melbourne has a Grand Slam final under his belt having gone down to fellow Aussie Pat Rafter in the 1998 US Open final.

Then there is that serve, the one which has brought 164 aces in his past six matches. While Federer is mustard keen to

prove he can move from the level of potential champion to the stage of actually getting his hands on the ultimate prize the same desire burns no less brightly in Philippoussis after almost two years spent fighting a succession of knee injuries. The Australian has defied predic-

tions that heavier balls and thicker and hence slower-playing grass would neutralise his booming serve which has brought him 86 percent of points played on his first serve thus
