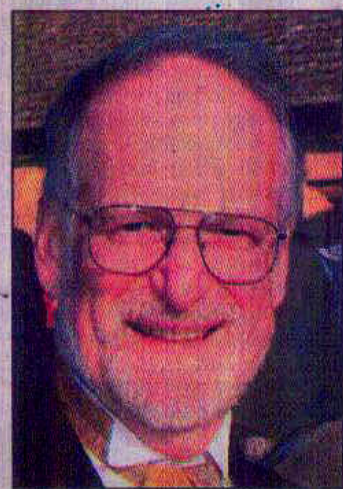

David Kelly found dead

A mild-mannered British scientist was found dead in the woods yesterday after being unwittingly dragged into a fierce political dispute about intelligence used to justify war on Iraq.

British police said they had found a body matching that of soft-spoken defence ministry biologist David Kelly, a former UN weapons

inspector, who had been grilled in parliament over allegations the government had used intelligence to justify war.

The political fallout was immediate. Prime Minister Tony Blair, who learned about the discovery of the body while flying from Washington to Tokyo, promised an independent judicial inquiry into the death if the body was confirmed to be Kelly's.

But opponents called for Blair to return and face a broader probe into the case he made for war. The shock even sent Britain's pound tumbling half a percent on currency markets as traders weighed the severity of the crisis for Blair.

Kelly's family reported him missing overnight after he went for a walk in the Oxfordshire countryside Thursday with no coat and

Blair defends Iraq war, Bush bashes 'sceptics'

With embattled British Prime Minister Tony Blair at his side, President Bush on Thursday stood by his assertion that Iraq was trying to reconstitute its nuclear weapons programme and declared: "We won't be proven wrong."

A joint White House press conference intended as a celebration of the US-British special relationship and the swift overthrow of Saddam Hussein, was marked instead by questions about post-war chaos in Iraq, disputed intelligence and British terror suspects held in a US military jail.

Blair defended British intelligence on Saddam's alleged weapons

of mass destruction which they used to justify invading Iraq, saying he believed it was "genuine."

Bush called it "sceptics" and lashed out at "the sceptics," who have focused on a now-discredited line in his State of the Union speech about Iraq's attempt to get uranium from Africa. The White House says it should not have been included in Bush's address.

"He (Saddam) possessed chemical weapons and biological weapons," Bush said. "I strongly believe he was trying to reconstitute his nuclear weapons program and I will remind the sceptics that in 1991 it became clear that Saddam Hussein was much closer to developing a nuclear weapon than anybody ever

imagined." "He (Saddam) was a threat. I take responsibility for dealing with that threat," Bush said, adding: "We won't be proven wrong... We will bring the information forward on the weapons when they find them and that'll end all this speculation."

In an impassioned defense of the war before a joint session of Congress, Blair said that toppling Saddam was justified even though weapons of mass destruction have failed to materialize.

"Can we be sure that terrorism and weapons of mass destruction will join together? Let us say one thing. If we are wrong we will have destroyed a threat that at its least is

Amini backs down on polls issue

A minor coalition party led by Fazul Haq Amini yesterday backed down on the Netrokona-3 by-election issue that had opened an apparent discord in the ruling alliance.

Amini, chairman of the Islami Oikya Jote (IOJ), told The Daily Star that he would support any candidature for the constituency, nominated by Prime Minister Khaleda Zia, although his party decided to field Ehtesham Sarwar Chowdhury.

"But I must say if Ehtesham Sarwar Chowdhury gets four-party nomination, it will be easy to win the polls."

At a press conference on Thursday, the IOJ announced the candidature of Ehtesham for the by-election to Netrokona-3 seat that fell

More city areas flooded

Situation in central districts worsens, slightly improves in north

Floodwaters swamped fresh low-lands in the central districts including Dhaka and its environs, but marked recession in the northern districts except for Sirajganj and Pabna yesterday.

Flooding in central Munshiganj, Manikganj, Narayanganj, Madaripur, Shariatpur, Rajbari and Tangail deteriorated as the Padma and its branches burst their banks, stranding lakhs of people in their submerged homes.

The southern district of Barisal and offshore island of Bhola reeled under the deluge.

In the northern region, major rivers began to recede in the wake of petering out of torrential monsoon rains in the upstream hilly regions across the frontiers.

This year's flooding has already claimed the lives of 75 people and affected more than 50 lakh others in

Anticrime crackdown in southwestern dists begins

The joint forces of police, Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and ansars began a crackdown on criminals, especially members of underground political parties, in southwestern districts last night.

The drive in Jessore, Kushtia, Chuadanga, Meherpur, Narail, Satkhira, Bagerhat, Khulna,

Jhenidah and Pirojpur began in the wake of widespread violence in the region that saw at least 31 people, including local government leaders and policemen, killed in 17 days.

About 14,000 additional BDR men along with police and ansars are carrying out the operation from their makeshift sector headquarters in Jessore, Satkhira, Pirojpur and Jhenidah, a source in Dhaka said,

requesting anonymity. "They will fan out to the criminals' hotbeds from there," he added.

Two alleged operatives of outlawed Purbo Banglar Communist Party (PBCP) -- Shahidul Islam, 32, and Karim Biswas, 37, -- were held in Narail Sadar in the first hours of the drive.

They are accused in multiple

SSC grading in fog

Parents, teachers and students are still confused about the grading system introduced in 2001.

Many guardians made phone calls to various newspaper offices, asking for clarification of the merit judgement system after this year's Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examination results were published Wednesday.

"We suffered from uncertainty until we understood our daughter's result fully," said Afia Rahman, a guardian of Dhanmondi. She said even teachers have no clear idea about the new system.

The education ministry issued a

notification for some changes in the grading system on January 4 this year.

The system, introduced in 2001 to measure students' aptitude in the SSC, will be applied in the Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) examinations this year.

The new grading system includes an additional letter grade A- (minus) with 3.5 grade point (GP). A student with an A- (below pass marks) grade in any subject cannot enrol in any college. However, the highest Grade Point Average (GPA) remains the same.

Individual results in public examinations will be published in GPA on the basis of a seven-step

letter grading instead of six steps.

The steps are A+ for GP 5.0 (80-100 marks), A for GP 4.0 (70-79), A- for GP 3.5 (60-69), B for GP 3.0 (50-59), C for GP 2.0 (40-49), D for GP 1.0 (33-39) and F for GP 0.0 (0-32).

Previously, the steps were A+ for GP 5.0 (80-100), A for GP 4.0 (60-79), B for GP 3.0 (51-59), C for GP 2.0 (41-50), D for GP 1.0 (33-40) and F for 0.0 (0-32).

Examinees who will not get F grade in any subject and whose GPA is at least 1.0 will be considered passed.

In the current method an examinee has to secure pass marks individually in every part of the

Bomb blast at Kushtia BNP leader's house: One killed

One person was killed and two others were injured in a bomb blast at the house of a local BNP leader at village Majdiar in Daulatpur upazila in the early hours of yesterday.

The dead was identified as Abdul Hannan, 35, son of Abu Bakr, of Jamalpur village.

Police and locals said the explosion occurred at around 3 am when Hannan and two of his associates -- Shamsul, 40, and Kamal Hossain, 30 -- were making bombs at the house of upazila BNP vice president Jahangir Alam, leaving the three seriously injured.

The injured were admitted to the Kushtia General Hospital and later shifted to the Rajshahi Medical College Hospital where Hannan died at noon.

The explosion blew off the CI sheet roof of the house. Police visited the area in the morning. None was arrested till yesterday evening.

AL to complain to speaker about JS bodies

The main opposition Awami League (AL) will lodge protest with the speaker against what it calls formation of parliamentary standing committees in violation of the constitution and the Rules of Procedure.

The AL will write a letter to Speaker Jamir Uddin Sircar after gazette notification of the committees, asking him to take necessary steps on the issue, Opposition Chief Whip Abdus Shahid told The Daily Star yesterday.

Depending on the speaker's move, the AL will think of nominating its deputies for the bodies, he added.

The ruling coalition constituted the committees keeping the slots of the AL vacant. The constitution and the Rules of Procedure do not permit partial formation of the bodies," Shahid said.

"As the custodian of the House, the speaker should take initiatives to resolve the problem."

The gazette notification of the committees is likely to be published this week by the parliament secretariat, sources said.

Forty-five standing committees were formed in the last two sessions keeping the AL slots vacant.

NCB capital deficit snowballs

The net capital deficit of the four nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) increased by Tk 125 crore to Tk 6,204 crore in the first three months of this year.

Classified loans of these banks rose by Tk 467 crore to Tk 12,653 crore in January-March, according to bank sources.

The deficit bloated because of an increase in provision shortfall against their default loans.

The finance ministry does not yet have any plan to re-capitalise the banks. Neither are the NCBs strong enough to earn more to fill up the

deficit.

"We are now examining the net deficits of the banks so that we can take some steps in the near future under the NCB reforms programme," says a finance ministry official.

The net deficit of Sonali Bank rose by Tk 158 crore to Tk 2,736 crore. This is equivalent to 35 per cent of the bank's total loans and advances of Tk 5,487 crore.

It faced a provision shortfall of Tk 2,376 crore during the period.

Janata Bank's capital shortfall shrunk by Tk 79 crore to Tk 1,412 crore in March. But its classified loans increased by Tk 137 crore to Tk

2,685 crore, representing about 29 per cent of its total loans.

Agrani Bank's capital shortfall in the first three months of this year increased by Tk 41 crore to Tk 1,172 crore. Its classified loans increased by Tk 33 crore to Tk 3,177 crore, claiming 38 per cent of total portfolio. The bank had a provision shortfall of Tk 959 crore.

Rupali Bank's capital shortfall increased by Tk 6 crore to Tk 832 crore during the same period. Its classified loans increased by Tk 32 crore to Tk 1,303 crore which is 31 per cent of its total portfolio.

The bank faced a provision shortfall of Tk 328 crore.
