# Trade ministers edge closer to farm pact

Trade ministers from the European Union, the United States and nearly two dozen other countries edged closer to agreement Tuesday in difficult farm trade negotiations, a WTO spokesman said.

"It's going to require an immense effort (to reach an agriculture deal), but I think on the basis of what we've seen today ... we're still in the game," World

Trade Organisation spokesman Keith Rockwell told reporters.

WTO Director General Supachai Panitchpakdi has stressed that trade ministers attending a three-day meeting this week in Montreal must reach a consensus on agricultural trade issues for the WTO's meeting in September in Cancun, Mexico, to be a success.

"It seems clear this morning that the ministers responded to this because really for the first

time there was engagement." on farm trade issues. Rockwell said.

The WTO membership has been divided on the appropriate formula for reducing farm tariffs, with the United States leading one camp calling for bigger cuts in higher tariffs and the EU leading other members favouring a straight percentage cut for all

agricultural spokesman Gregor Kreuhuber said that in the meeting on Tuesday morning

trade ministers for the first time discussed a possible blending of those two approaches as a way of dealing with the market access issue

"I think this could be a very good basis for finding a solution,' he said.

WTO members also must reach agreement on two other main areas of the agriculture negotiations, domestic farm subsidies and export subsidies.

#### India's IT market to be worth \$42.6b by 2006: IDC

India's IT market was forecast by an industry monitor Wednesday to grow 27.9 per cent annually to be worth 1.96 trillion rupees (42.6 billion dollars) by 2006.

International Data Corp. said India's IT sector was more stable than the worldwide market and total domestic spending on information technology would grow 21 per cent every year to reach 559 billion rupees within three years.

"The last year for the information technology industry was full of fear, uncertainty and doubt and decision being taken with a great degree of trepidation," said Pradeep Gupta, managing director of IDC India.

"This was mainly attributed to the dot-com crash, the slide in the US economy, the telecom capacity glut and the events of September 11 and its aftermath," Gupta told a business conference in India's technology hub of Bangalore.

He said the industry crashed with worldwide spending on technology declining from 10.8 per cent in 1999 to a negative 4.1 per cent in

### Jakarta's 2nd gas pipeline to S'pore opens Monday

Singapore will get a third source of natural gas from next month. On Monday, Indonesian President Megawati Sukarnoputri inaugurates her country's second direct gas pipeline to Singapore, part of a US\$9 billion (S\$15.8 billion) deal signed in February 2001.

Prime Minister Goh Chok Tong and ASEAN energy ministers will attend the ceremony in Batam.

The 470km pipeline starts in Grissik, southern Sumatra.

It is expected to be operational early next month and will start pumping 50 million standard cubic feet a day (cfd) into Singapore's power grid. By 2009, it is expected to hit as much as 350 million cfd. more than doubling Indonesia's current supply of 325 million cfd to Singapore

The pipeline also makes Singapore's supply of the cheap energy source more secure.

Republic currently gets its gas from Indonesia's Natuna Island and

The World Bank has recommended major changes in labour practices in the Chittagong port to introduce an efficient system to retain the country's export competitiveness especially after the end of the Multi-Fibre Arrangement (MFA)

The Bank in a recent study on infrastructure in Bangladesh said, "The unions in Bangladesh ports are lar, they are aggressive in defending

The Bank pointed out that overmanning and lack of management control over the workforce were major problems.

unions are opposed to privatisation and the development of new container facilities that would reduce the demand of labour.

At Chittagong, 18,400 people are employed to handle cargo on a daily basis. This is five times the number of people that should normally be required for port with Chittagong's throughput, the study said.

It observed that the current labour hiring practices at the port also need to be addressed. "Private stevedoring companies are required to recruit their workers from the authorities concerned," the study said.
