### Dhaka brushes aside Delhi plan for joint border patrol

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan has brushed aside an Indian proposal for joint patrolling of the border between the two countries. "Such exercise is not feasible," he

told The Daily Star yesterday. India proposed the joint patrol during the biennial meeting of the heads of the Border Security Force (BSF) and the Bangladesh Rifles

(BDR) in New Delhi in April. India suggested that a modality should be worked out so that the border security personnel of both countries could jointly patrol to

prevent smuggling, illegal immigration and other cross-border illegal activities

Foreign ministry sources said Dhaka was not interested in the proposal as it will allow the BSF to enter Bangladesh territory at will. This will have a 'grave political implication', they said.

# 2 Marines killed, 5 hurt in Iraq

Bremer predicts elections within a year

Two American soldiers were killed and five wounded yesterday in attacks in and around the Iraqi capital, Baghdad.

The US military said a member of the 1st Armoured Division was killed and three of his colleagues were injured when their armoured personnel carrier hit a landmine on a road in Baghdad.

But eyewitnesses said the vehicle was hit by a rocket-propelled grenade or rocket fired at close range. Earlier, a unit from the 4th

Infantry Division come under small arms fire at a tactical operations centre near Baqubah, north-east of the city. One soldier died and two

# Secretaries must explain fund frauds to JS body

The first meeting of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) of the current Jatiya Sangsad yesterday made the presence of secretaries mandatory for its sittings.

All secretaries must be accountable to PAC, a constitutional body, and must attend its meetings in person to explain irregularities in the spending of public funds, the meeting resolved.

"We will work to bring transparency to public expenditure. Secretaries have to be accountable to the committee," said Harun Al Rashid, chairman of the JS body,

"According to the committee

decision, we will not allow representatives of secretaries at the meeting. Secretaries must attend the meeting," Khurram Khan Chowdhury, member of PAC, told The Daily Star yesterday. "We will review expenditures of

all the ministries, so secretaries must be present to explain the spending. The comptroller and auditor
