Hoon to take blame as 'fall guy'

British Prime Minister Tony Blair faces the gravest test of his political career today as a judicial inquiry begins investigating the death of David Kelly, the scientist central to claims Blair's government exaggerated the case for war in Iraq.

Over the next two months, a long series of witnesses will be called to a bland-looking room attached to the


Royal Courts of Justice in central London to give evidence that could potentially damage Blair's reputation beyond repair.

Among those due to be called before senior judge Lord Brian Hutton, heading the inquiry, are a string of government officials, ministers and -- eventually -- Blair himself

Strike to compound DU session jam

Dhaka University (DU) students are going to face another spate of session iams due to the weeklong strike at the university till August 7 enforced by the Bangladesh

Chhatra League (BCL). "Over 25, 000 students may face academic clogging of at least two to three months due to the unscheduled closure that paralysed the university. Classes and examinations had to be rescheduled, which has a trickle-down effect," said a senior DU official.

Session jams delay publication of results and compound accommodation problem at the halls, he mentioned

The DU students are already about two years behind their aca-

demic sessions.

Controller of Examinations of the university Mohammad Abdul Latif said, "Thirty-one scheduled examinations of different departments and institutes of the university were postponed because of the six-day strike and classes were also affected. It will take time to resched-

Students of the DU lost at least 557 days of the last 13 academic sessions and seven days in the current session that began on July 1

because of unscheduled closures. Besides the scheduled vacation

of about 90 days a year, the university remained closed for more than 42 days a year on an average due to students' strike, hartal and such other grounds.

During the autocratic rule of HM Ershad, the DU remained closed for 474 days from 1980-81 academic session to 1989-90 session

The last session (2002-03) witnessed 72 days of unscheduled closure, including 67 days for the

Shamsunnahar Hall incident. The academic session 1991-92

had 94 lost academic days, the SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

3 tremors jolt Borkol

Study fears strong quakes in Ctg region

A series of three aftershocks rattled Arabunia in Rangamati district yesterday, stirring panic in a region reeling under frequent jolts since a moderate tremor on July 27. Arabunia is closer to Kolabunia

in Borkol upazila which according to the find of a study disclosed yesterday sits on an epicentre. Kolabunia took the strongest

shakes by the July tremor. The first aftershock hit at 4:10am

followed by the second at 2:12pm and a third at 4:43pm amid driving rain, high winds and lightening which have been battering the region since Friday, locals said.

The hilly terrain of Borkol upazila is witnessing fatal landslides in the

wake of the moderate quake that locals say loosened hilltop stones and giant piles of mud.

Some 50 families fled their home from the south part of Arabunia village for fear of mudslides, villager and political activist Mohammed Ali

Some 20 tribal families have shifted their homes to Longdu upazila, a neighbouring upazila, said villagers Aoshuk Kumar and Phool Mohan Chakma. About 400 tribal and non-tribal

families live in Arabunia, locals said. Deputy Commissioner of Rangamati Dr Zafar Ahmed Khan said two quakes hit the region on

Meanwhile, a five-member unofficial taskforce has come up with a 20-point recommendations and a 10-point technical observation after a daylong survey in Borko upazila on August 8.

They said the epicentre of the tremor lurked 11 km below the ground in Kolabunia and all 10 upazilas of Rangamati district ran the risk of strong tremors.

"It is not a new topic, the Chittagong Hill Tracts was marked vulnerable to quakes during the British rule," said Dr Jahangir Alam, chief of the taskforce, at the deputy commissioner's office yesterday.

The Bangladesh Institute of Technology (BIT) in Chittagong of which Jahangir is the chief conducted the post-quake study.

Thieves bore gas lines to pilfer Tk 1 lakh condensate a day

Aided by some policemen and gas pipeline operators, thieves are pilfering liquid gas condensate worth Tk 1 lakh a day by boring holes in gas pipelines

The Gas Transmission Company Ltd. (GTCL) has found out that up to 10,000 litres of condensate a day are being pilfered by boring holes and installing valves in the pipelines in Ashuganj in Brahmanbaria.

The GTCL sealed one such leakage last week and found a halfsunken boat with 36 drums full of

condensate in Brahmanbaria four

days ago. "Thieves use this conden-

sate to adulterate petroleum prod-

ucts, especially kerosene," said a GTCL official. "A litre of condensate is officially sold at Tk 10.

"Such theft needs technical knowledge common thieves do not know of," said the official, "and we believe the Brahmanbaria Sadar police are abetting these thieves in the act because they refused to take a case against the thieves for four days till we exerted influence on

Bangladesh produces about 4,000 barrels of condensate a day and 3,000 barrels are produced by three gas fields in Sylhet and the remainder by other gas fields of the country. The gas from Sylhet is SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Petrobangla to seek ministry's help to solve gas crisis

Petrobangla will seek guidelines and a decision from the energy ministry to solve the ongoing gas crisis that began last week, official sources said yesterday.

Director (operation) of Petrobangla Dr Ismail yesterday held a meeting with all chiefs of production and marketing companies. GTCL and BAPEX to find wavs to solve the crisis which might continue unless industrial supply was cut, said an official of Petrobangla.

The official said thousands of households are facing difficulty during cooking as the gas shortage stands at over 20 million cubic feet with a current supply of 1260mmcft against a demand of over 1,280mmcft

The demand is so high that there is no alternative to reducing power supply either to fertiliser factories or Bangladesh Power Development Board (BPDB), two major gas consumers, a senior official was quoted as saying at the meeting held at Petrocentre.

Proposals were also made to reduce gas supply to brick fields to meet the demand for domestic consumption, sources said.

The Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) plans to hand around 35 parks to private organisations to ensure their proper maintenance, DCC officials

It has dawned upon the DCC that

it is unable to maintain the parks and

so wants to give the task to the private sector, the officials said. "We have talked the issue with environmentalists who suggested private sector involvement," said DCC Chief Engineer Dr Golam

Quadeer M Chowdhury. DCC Chief Estate Officer AKM Fazluzzoha said, "DCC properly takes care of the Shishu Park at Shahbagh out of 47 parks, while three parks at Shyamoli, Gulshan

and Sayedabad have been leased out to private organisations.'

The rest are also supposed to be looked after by the DCC, but these have slid into degradation. "We have drafted a proposal in

discussion with the DCC for proper maintenance of the parks by private organisations," said Prof. Abdullah Abu Sayeed, an educationist and environmentalist.

The DCC would float tenders seeking offers from private firms for maintenance of the parks. At the same time, the corporation would solicit some reputed organisations to take the responsibility.

Taylor to hand over power today



Liberia's President Charles Taylor began his last full day in office yesterday before his promised resignation under US pressure to try to end 14 years of strife that have spewed chaos into West Africa. The latest bout of bloodshed

between Taylor's forces and rebels has left at least 2,000 dead in the capital Monrovia since June and stranded hundreds of thousands without homes or enough food. Since Taylor began a war to end

a brutal dictatorship in 1989. the country founded in hope by freed 19th century American slaves has become a byword for anarchy spread by a generation of intoxicated young killers inured to sav-At least a quarter of a million

people are thought to have died in Liberia's war and closely entwined conflicts in Sierra Leone, Guinea



and Ivory Coast. Taylor, in control of only part of his own capital, told to step down by
