Nods for Rajin, Alamgir

A more or less predictable 15-man Bangladesh Test team for its tour of Pakistan was announced vesterday afternoon with just two changes from the squad that played in the Test series against Australia last

Middle order batsman Al-Shahriar and right arm paceman Tareq Aziz Khan got the chop with Rajin Saleh Alam and Alamgir Kabir coming in as their replacements respectively.

Speculation was already high about Al-Shahriar's possible omission and it was learnt from reliable sources that the selectors had lengthy discussions yesterday and on the previous day before agreeing on dropping the classy yet inconsis-

tent right-hander. In his 15-match career, Al-Shahriar had scored 683 runs in 30 innings at an average of 22.77. In Australia, his one bright moment came when he made a stroke-filled 36 in the second innings of the first Test at Darwin but that wasn't enough for him to get selected for the second Test at Cairns

Although other specialist batsmen like Javed Omar and

Mohammed Ashraful performed miserably in Australia, rather inexplicably, Al-Shahriar seemed to be

the favourite choice for a scapegoat. Tareq Aziz on the other hand, just appeared in one warm-up game in

impressive showing in last season's national league, Premier League and on the Bangladesh under-23 team's tour of Sri Lanka in June.

His previous association with the Tigers was during the inaugural Test against India in November 2000

when he was the 12th man. The muscular quick Alamgir has been rewarded for his fine form with Bangladesh under-23 team in Sri

"We never thought of making to many changes. However, we still debated and in the end felt convinced that this was the best possible selection," said chief selector Faruque Ahmed.

He said that Rajin deserved a berth in the national team for his good form over last two seasons.


'Rajin scored lot of runs in domestic cricket and also performed commendably in Sri Lanka. Besides, he is one of the best fielders in the country. That has helped him earn his place in the list. Alamgir also bowled well in Sri Lanka," said the former Bangladesh captain.


When asked why there was no specialist off-spinner in the side, Faruque said that they had originally thought of taking Naimur Rahman but his fitness let him down.

"We called Naimur. But he failed to prove his fitness. Besides, the Pakistanis play spin very well and we lack quality spinners. That's why we did not think too much about the slow bowling aspect," said Faruque. Farugue also revealed that free-

stroking opener Shahriar Hossain came very close to earning a recall after three years in the wilderness but a finger injury spoiled that pros-

"The injury to his right index finger needs another 15 days to heal. That's why he couldn't be considered.

The two young cricketers who excelled during the Under-23 team's tour of Sri Lanka last month attributed their call-up to chief selector Faruque Ahmed, who was the tour manager. Interestingly both the cricketers played under Farugue in City Club last season.

It was a dream come true for the 19year-old Rajin whose only appearance for the national team was in the inaugural Test against India and that too was as a 12th

"I believe all my hard work has paid off. For the last two years I have been performing well both in National League and the Premier Division. The Sri Lanka tour was a challenge and I have proved my ability to get the nod," said an extremely elated Rajin after the training at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

could be a very handy close-in fielder by taking two sharp catches at forward short leg.

The right-hander who often bats in the middle-order scored 217 runs at an average of 42 in Sri Lanka.

Right-arm paceman Alamgir Kabir was the pick of the bowlers in Sri Lanka. His accuracy, pace and the ability to bowl a good bouncer impressed the selectors.

"I was optimistic about getting the selectors nod after doing well in Sri Lanka. Faruque Bhai helped me lot during the tour to improve my bowling," said an excited Alamgir.

The 22-year-old from cricketer from Rajshahi played only one Test against Sri Lanka last year. He failed to get a single wicket and was subsequently dropped from the national team. "When I was dropped after the

playing only one Test I vowed that I would make a come back," said the stocky paceman. But his career got back on track in Sri Lanka, where he claimed 24

wickets in seven matches including a record eight-wicket burst in a twoday match against Sri Lankan Max

"The new team management has suggested that the pay scale of a cricketer should not be solely based on seniority. Rather it should strike a balance with performance and the effort he puts in on the ground," said Mahbub while talking to a group of reporters at Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday

"We will discuss the proposals in our next Board meeting to be held on Monday," he said

He however hinted that the number of players on the pay-roll would be increased three times than what it is now

At tea on the opening day England were 212 for two with lefthander Butcher 103 not out and former captain Nasser Hussain 72

Surrey batsman Butcher had faced 173 balls including 21 fours and Essex's Hussain 129 balls with

12 boundaries. Together the pair put on an unbroken 183 in 47 overs after England, 1-0 down in the five Test series, had slumped to 29 for two.

England resumed after lunch on

Hussain 20 not out.

Hussain, who had cover-driven securely before lunch, used the stroke to take a four off fast bowler Makhaya Ntini and later leg-glanced the paceman for another boundary. Ntini then saw left-hander

Butcher, on 41, edge him past the outstretched hand of second slip Jacques Kallis, playing his first match of the series following the death of his father. Butcher, who on nought saw an

Ibw appeal from Shaun Pollock rejected by Daryl Harper - umpiring alongside fellow Australian Darrell Hair - after the ball appeared to pitch

outside leg stump, was unmoved. He cut Ntini up and over point for four before a single off Pollock gave him his fifty.

To make matters worse for Ntini. who in the Proteas' innings and 92 run second Test victory became the first South African to take 10 wickets

in a Lord's Test, he received two official warnings for running on the

Another warning would see him unable to bowl again in the innings. Hussain then brought up a
