Nine indigenous women, three of a family, were gangraped and some others assaulted physically during a nearly eight-hour mob attacks on at least 10 villages in Mohalchhari upazila of Khagrachhari district on Wednesday, Parbattya Chattagram Jano Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) leader Polash Khisha alleged

More than 400 houses in those villages, two Buddhist temples and three shops were set ablaze and an elderly indigenous man was killed during the attacks, said Polash, PCJSS Rangamati district unit

Polash made the allegations at a protest rally in front of the deputy commissioner's office here at 11am

The rape victims included the wife and two teenage daughters of Shashodhar Chakma of Pahartoli village and six others of Dupoizza Neel village, he said.

Russian sub sinks

2 bodies recovered, 7 more feared dead

A Russian nuclear-powered submarine sank in stormy Arctic seas on vesterday as it was being towed into port for scrapping and up to nine servicemen appeared likely to have been killed, defense officials

Defense officials said the K-159 sank to a depth of 510 feet in the Barents Sea but did not represent a danger since its nuclear reactors were shut down in 1989 when it was decommissioned.

A ministry spokesman said the bodies of two servicemen were recovered after the incident, which happened in an early morning storm, and one officer was rescued alive from the crew of 10.

But Russia's navy chief-of-staff Viktor Kravchenko said the chances

of finding the seven missing sailors alive were slim given heaving seas and a water temperature of 50 F.

"Unfortunately, the hopes of finding alive the missing are very slight," he said, though a sea and air rescue operation continued.

Kravchenko, in a televised exchange with Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov, said both reactors had been switched off on the K-159 in 1989 and "put into a nuclear safe condition.

"At this site, the radioactive level is normal," he said.

Navy spokesman Igor Dygalo said all weapons, including torpedoes and rockets, had also been removed from the vessel when it was decommissioned. The 40-yearold former attack submarine was being towed along the coast of the Kola Peninsula to a scrap yard at porting it broke apart.

It tipped over and sank three miles northwest of Kildin Island. There were only 10 crew on board when the accident happened

at 8 p.m. EDT. The incident bore uncanny echoes of the Kursk disaster in which a nuclear submarine sank also in the Barents sea, three years ago this month, killing all its 118

crew and enveloping the then newly

elected President Vladimir Putin in a

political row. Another similarity is that Putin is on holiday as he was when the Kursk went down -- this time in Sardinia with Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi.

Federation of Bangladesh Chamber of Commerce and Industries (FBCCI) Abdul Awal Mintoo, one of six people accused in the case, was also granted bail. Mintoo's Trans World Engineering and Trading Company Limited assisted in the DW 2000H frigate purchase from South Korea's Daewoo

Weather this year makes itself manifest strangely although the weathermen would not call it unusual. In the first eight months, the

country has weathered an unusually severe cold wave in January, an equally unbearable heat wave in May, an early flood in May, and an unusual cyclone. And now the monsoon is having a deficit rainfall. which the Meteorological Office terms a 'bad monsoon', which is not

"We are yet to carry out any study regarding this (the strange nature of weather). So we cannot say the weather has been unusual. It is actually inter-annual variation of the weather," said Samarendra Karmakar, deputy director of the Met Office.

But he said both temperature and rate of rainfall in the country are showing an upward trend despite

this year's deficit rainfall. A study of weather from 1961 to

1990 shows the temperature is rising at .0037 degrees Celsius a year and the rainfall is increasing at around 4 millimetres a year. The finds of the study conducted by the Met Office were published in 1998.

In June the rainfall was 47 per

cent surplus, but in July the rainfall

fell 28 per cent short and up to August 25, the percentage of deficiency reached 49 per cent. According to the experts, it could

turn into an agriculture drought. The last severe drought happened in In January this year, a cold wave

swept the country with the temperature breaking the record of the last 34 years. Only 3.4 degrees Celsius temperature was recorded in Raishahi on January 23. The lowest ever temperature (2.8 degrees Celsius) was recorded on February 4, 1968 at Srimangal. People have gone through

weeks of sweltering heat for the last two consecutive years. During last SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Weather gets into WTO settles drug pact for poor nations

The World Trade Organization on Saturday sealed an agreement to allow poor countries to import cheap copies of patented drugs for killer diseases like AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis The WTO's supreme General

Council gave formal approval to an agreement reached by a lower body late Thursday. The agreement had run into political wrangling that took intensive intervention from governments to resolve.

"This is a historic agreement for the WTO," Director-General Supachai Panitchpakdi said.

"The final piece of the jigsaw has fallen into place, allowing poorer countries to make full use of the flexibilities in the WTO's intellectual property rules in order to deal with the diseases that ravage their people," Supachai said.

The deal was finalized on the sixth straight day of meetings by diplomats in the 146-nation body. The representatives had nearly

reached a deal by 1 a.m. Friday after marathon session, but it fell through minutes later. That failure was a surprise, since the same officials earlier accepted the agreement after the United States ended an eight-month holdout.

Negotiators said the deal had stumbled over demands by some countries to make statements before the WTO's General Council formally approved the deal. Those statements can be used to spell out limits countries will place on their adherence to the accord.

Philippines ambassador Edse Custodio said his country was ready to accept the agreement as it stood but still wanted to make a statement

Bhuiyan Iambastes Hasina for hinting at PM's hand in Imam murder

The Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) issued a statement yesterday strongly condemning the remarks of Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina during a recent speech where the opposition leader accused the prime minister of having a hand in the killing of Khulna AL leader Manzurul Imam.

Terming Hasina's remark as being "devoid of common sense", BNP Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan in the statement accused the AL chief of peddling falsehood against the BNP chief and its other leaders through her "indecorous statement".

"It is an utter lie that Imam was killed because he vied with BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia in the last general election," he added.

"We don't have the language to respond to such rubbish. People are well aware that such false remarks are customary of Sheikh Hasina Even the highest court had advised her to be more sensible and exercise more restraint while making statements." Bhuivan said.

He said it is common knowledge that the AL wants to make political gains even through killing its own men. "Sheikh Hasina's accusation against the prime minister is merely SEE PAGE 11 COL 8

4 held for suspected link to Najaf blast

The suspects detained by police in connection with the Najaf bombing are two Iraqis from Saddam Hussein's fallen regime and two Arab nationals, described as Sunni Muslim radicals, Najaf Governor Haidar Mehdi Matar told the news agency yesterday.

who belonged to the former regime, while the other two were Arab Wahhabis," Matar said. "They confessed to the bombing." Wahhabi is a byword for those

"Two were Iraqis from Basra,

subscribing to the puritanical vision of Osama bin Laden's al-Qaeda terror group.

Matar said the four were apprehended by a crowd minutes after Friday's blast outside a mosque in which prominent cleric and politician Avatollah Mohammad Bager alHakim and 82 others were killed. Another 125 were wounded in the attack. The death toll yesterday

rose to 87 "People in the street thought they looked bizarre, captured them and handed them to police," Matar said.

The attackers communicated by mobile phone in the minutes before they detonated two cars packed with explosives.

"The explosion occurred at 2:10pm (local time) when a mini bus and another car were detonated by remote control. The vehicles were packed with a total of 700 kilograms of dynamite, mortars and hand grenades," Matar said.

The blast ripped through the area at the very moment. Hakim, considered a stabilising influence on Iraq. left the mosque compound after delivering his weekly sermon to a sea of faithful

Earlier, a police source had told AFP all four detainees were foreign Arab fighters and that three others had escaped.

The London representative of

Hakim's political party, the Supreme Council for the Islamic Revolution in Iraq (SCIRI), said the arrests lent credibility to suspicions of an alliance between al-Qaeda and veterans of Saddam's regime.

"I suspect there was a collaboration here between al-Qaeda and Saddam's people, as well as in the blasts at the UN headquarters and Jordan embassy (in Baghdad), said Hamed al Bayati.

Discussing the three devastating attacks in a short span of three weeks, Bayati said: "They are using new tactics car bombings, suicide bombings that have the fingerprints of al-Qaeda


"The EC did not receive any answer from the Armed Forces
