#### Cheap medicine pact under fire from NGOs

SomeWTO members may be patting themselves on the back for the agreement on low-cost medicines for poor countries, citing it as proof that they can indeed work together, but NGOs in Cancun for the Fifth World Trade Organisation Ministerial Conference say there is little reason to celebrate.

"The deeper problem has not been resolved," Michael Bailey, spokesman for the Britain-based non-governmental organisation Oxfam International, told IPS. The only thing the WTO did, he said, is open a very small door that is difficult to pass through.

Ellen t'Hoen, of Doctors Without Borders (Médecins Sans Frontières), based in Paris, had similar criticisms. The agreement says poor countries may have greater access to

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### WTO talks risk breakdown

Poor states threaten to block 'bad' farm deal; US, EU accused of trying to split G21

As rich and poor nations struggle to find a compromise deal to save the Cancun trade talks threatened by disputes over farm subsidy, Singapore has been asked to mediate the tottering farm talks and is expected to produce a draft compromise text early this morning

A powerful alliance of poor and developing countries under the umbrella of Group of 21 (G21) has threatened to block a deal rather than accept a bad one.

Poor nations have accused Europe and the United States of trying to break up the new alliance bent on rewriting global trade rules.

The G21-- spearheaded by China, India, Brazil and South Africa -- has threatened the traditional dominance of rich countries during the trade talks. It has demanded that rich countries slash more than \$300

billion a year in subsidies -- more than six times the amount they give to poor countries as aid -- which protect their farmers from cheaper imports and let them export to nations whose farmers get no such

The big question now was whether the alliance could remain united, or whether "the US would pick countries off one by one", a spokeswoman for aid agency Action

So far, the G21 was standing firm, and new members were expected to join in the next few days, she said. The G21 could shift the power at the 146-nation WTO talks towards the poor world for the first time, she added.

The G21 says the rich world needs to keep the promises it made two years ago to cut tariffs.

The EU and US say poorer countries must agree to broader legal and SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Anti-WTO protest rally in city

Hundreds of protesters yesterday mourned the suicide of a South Korean farmer at a demonstration in Dhaka against the world trade talks in Cancun and demanded punishment to the guilty. Some left-leaning parties staged

separate demonstrations against discriminations to poor nations at the meeting of World Trade Organisation (WTO) ministers in the Mexican resort.

"We want punishment to those responsible for the death of farmer Lee Kyang Hae," Shireen Akhter, president of Karmojibi Nari, told a rally at Shahbagh.

"We will not allow the Cancun meet to succeed if it does not take the demands of poor nations into SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

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
