# Sayedee no more MP

### HC finds him guilty of election fraud

The High Court (HC) Division yesterday stripped ruling Jamaat-e-Islami leader Delwar Hossain Sayedee of membership of parliament (Jatiya Sangsad) for submitting false statement on his poll expenses and violating other elec-

The HC in its judgement declared his election for Pirojpur-1 constitu-ency null and void for corruption, illegal practice and violation of the Representation of People's Order, 1972, setting the first example of

The court found Sayedee guilty on several counts: he concealed the sources of election fund, spent more money than Tk 5 lakh ceiling set by election rules and did not send an affidavit along with his poll expenses to the Election Commission (EC).

A one-member HC bench with Justice Mohammad Iman Ali gave the ruling on the election of Sayedee following a petition by main opposition Awami League leader Shudhangshu Shekhor Halder that

#### CHT accord under review

The government is reviewing the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) accord to find whether it contained anything contrary to the constitution and will amend it, if need be, a minister told the Jatiya Sangsad yester-

MKAnwar, the minister in charge of CHT affairs in parliament, disclosed the government plan in reply to a query of Jatiya Party lawmaker

"We will go for an amendment if necessary after reviewing the accord," Anwar, also agriculture minister, said.

The minister however said no rights to protection of property were violated by the CHT accord, signed

in 1997 with the indigenous people. In reply to another question by ruling BNP lawmaker Shahid Uddin Chowdhury Anny, the minister said some provisions were included in the accord to protect the rights of indigenous people.

## Troubled talks set to drag on for a day

Poor, rich states still deeply divided

World trade talks were set to be extended by a day at Cancún, as trade ministers of 146 WTO states grappled with continuing differences over farm subsidies and a host of other contentious issues.

With less than 10 hours to reach a consensus (till 2:00am BST) and a looming threat of talks failure, ministers say they do not see any sign of improvement in the given deadline and chances can be made only by extending it, according to journalists and delegates at the meeting venue.

Deeply divided, the trade ministers are still trying to give a final push to bring rich and poor countries ogether and rescue troubled talks on freeing up global markets, according to reports from BBC News Online, Reuters, AFP and WTO official website.

The mood was sombre as the delegates met for a final round of

hard bargaining.
There has been criticism from virtually all sides of a compromise declaration drawn up in an attempt to bring the ministerial meeting to a successful conclusion later on

The main disagreement is over subsidies paid to farmers in rich nations, but developing countries are also upset by proposals to negotiate

new rules on foreign investment.

No country is entirely happy with the latest draft circulated about 24hours ago. A top European Union official said it crossed several red

The least developed countries (LDCs), African Union (AU) and block of African, Caribbean and Pacific nations (ACPs) in a joint statement have expressed utter dissatisfaction over the draft for not

reflecting the interest of the LDCs. The draft calls for an end to export subsidies on farm products of special interest to developing countries, designed to tackle the most harmful impact of subsidised

Police to be equipped with Chinese rifles, close circuit cams to curb crime

The government will equip the police force with Chinese rifles instead of .303 rifles and install close circuit cameras at crowded places in the city to combat crimes.

Home Minister Altaf Hossain Chowdhury said this in response to questions in parliament yesterday.
"There are 45,000 .303 rifles in

police department. We have planned to provide them with Chinese rifles in phases," the minister said responding to a question from BNP lawmaker Alamgir Mohammad Mahfuz Ullah Farid.

## Say sorry, we'll return to JS

Hasina tells PM, speaker

The main opposition Awami League (AL) yesterday preconditioned its return to parliament with apologies from the prime minister and the speaker for their recent remarks.

Emerging from an hour-long crucial meeting of the AL Parliamentary Party (ALPP) at the Sangsad Bhaban last night, Leader of the Opposition Sheikh Hasina demanded apologies for the pre-mier's remarks that she said undermined an AL lawmaker and the speaker's comment about the functioning of parliament.

During Saturday's visit to Faridpur on the occasion of the joining of Bangladesh Jatiya Party leader Shah Mohammad Abu Jafar to the people of the constituency as their 'undeclared lawmaker'.

Hasina dubbed the premier's



comment as a 'complete negation of people's' elected representative Kazi Sirajul Islam', lawmaker for

Faridpur-1 constituency. The same day, at a meeting with Opposition Chief Whip Abdus : Shanid, the speaker said despite the absence of opposition AL lawmakers,
