The Jahangirnagar University Teachers' Association (JUTA) yesterday announced a nine-day 'non-cooperation programme' to press home their two-point demand including the removal of the vice-chancellor.

The other demand is the punishment to the Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) activists who confined the provost and eight house tutors of Shaheed Salam Barkat (SSB) hall on August 11.

The programme was decided at a general meeting of JUTA at the teachers' lounge of the university cafeteria.

Presided over by Prof Amin Mohammad Ali, president of JUTA, the meeting was attended by about 75 teachers including Prof Enamul Huq Khan, Prof Md Nasiruddin Ahmed, Prof Mustahidur Rahman, Prof Dr Afsar Ahmad and Asstt Prof Ali Akand. The programme will be observed in

two phases.
The first phase includes boycott of classes from tomorrow to September 17.

All examinations will be kept out its purview.

The second phase of the programme beginning from

September 24 includes boycott of all

classes and examinations.

During the second phase, all academic and administrative activities of the university will also be boycotted.

JUTA also decided to seek the intervention of Chancellor Prof lajuddin Ahmad to meet their demands and solve other problems on the campus.

It condemned the decision of the Teachers' Association of Jahangirnagar University (TAJU), another platform of teachers having link with the vice chancellor, on the incident of August 11.

At a general meeting on September 4, TAJU blamed the SSB hall authorities for the incident.
