AFP, Manila World champion Saif Safed Shaheen bit the dust Sunday as he was sensationally beaten in the Asian athletics championships men's 1,500 meters final following

3,000-meter steeplechase. The Kenyan transplant, now running for Qatar, made a bold gamble by ceding his favorite discipline to Busan Asian Games champion Khamis Abdulla in hopes of doubling Qatar's gold medal haul in two track events held 75 minutes

his shock withdrawal from the

Abdulla duly delivered, but Shaheen, once known as Stephen Cherono and the winner of steeplechase gold at the Paris world championships last month, sprinted too early and was beaten by eventual winner Ramzi Rashid of Bahrain, the reigning men's 1,500m Asian Games champion.

Shaheen made his ill-timed burst on the 900m mark, only to be overhauled by Rashid as they began the

The 20 year-old, fifth in the 1,500m event at the Lausanne Super Grand Prix in July, stepped on the gas but his tank was empty as Rashid, 23, had the stronger finishing kick.

The Bahraini runner won in 3mins 41.66secs, while Shaheen settled for the silver in 3.42.79. Japan's Fumikazu Kobayashi had threatened Shaheen but settled for third in 3.42.96.

"I know Shaheen is a world champion, so I held my power in reserve for the final round," the

Bahraini said. "He went too soon. Shaheen greeted his silver medal finish with a helpless shrug.

Hewitt Australia's hero

Lleyton Hewitt clawed back from two sets and 3-5 down to put Australia into the Davis Cup tennis final with a titanic five-set victory over Switzerland's Roger Federer in the semi-final here on Sunday.

The former world number one looked down for the count as the Wimbledon champion advanced on an apparent straight sets victory, but somehow the 22-year-old Australian found that little bit extra to

pull out one of his greatest victories. Hewitt's 5-7, 2-6, 7-6, 7-5, 6-1 triumph clinched the tie in the fourth singles rubber after Australia had edged in front, winning Saturday's oubles in five sets

Switzerland's Michel Kratochvil won the dead final singles rubber when Todd Woodbridge, a replacement for Mark Philippoussis, retired after the Swiss player won the opening set 6-4. Australia won the tie 3-2.

Federer dazzled Hewitt in the opening two and a half sets, but his torrid schedule of three matches in as many days began to tell and the leg-weary former Wimbledon and US Open champion embarked on a courageous fightback to pull back from the brink. Hewitt's exhilarating victory

halted Federer's unbeaten run of 10 singles matches in Davis Cup and 31 winning sets and ended

Switzerland's dream of a first-ever Cup title after reaching the final against the United States in 1992.

Argentina on November 28-30. It is expected to be played on grass at Melbourne Park. It was Hewitt's eighth win in 10 encounters with Federer, the world number three, and puts his Davis

Cup singles record to 22-5. "This beats the hell out of winning the US Open and Wimbledon, I tell you right now," Hewitt told the crowd moments after his euphoric

"It's an incredible feeling, I've dreamt of playing these matches ... I watched Pat Cash against (Sweden's) Mikael Pernfors over at Kooyong (in 1986) come back after being two sets to love down.

The whole time when I was down two sets to love and I ended up getting out of the third, I was just thinking of that match.'

Hewitt said when Federer was serving for the match, he sensed the Swiss was tightening up.

"I know anyone serving for a match is always going to be a little bit nervous and I just tried to make him play every point and he gave
