Al-Qaeda-Pak troops clash leaves 13 dead

Pakistani troops killed 12 al-Qaeda suspects and captured 12 militants in a dramatic siege Thursday involving helicopter gunships and ground forces in this remote northwestern area on the Afghan border.

One Pakistani soldier was killed and two injured in the day-long gun battle, military spokesman Shaukat Sultan said.

The captured included four suspected al-Qaeda fighters, six suspected Taliban supporters and two others, army officers said.

The operation, launched after attacks on troops in Afghanistan's adjacent Paktika province, began with a dawn siege of an al-Qaeda hideout five km from the border at Angoor Adad in South Waziristan.

Journalists taken by the Pakistani army to the scene as fighting raged were shown four dead bodies covered in shrouds, 10 prisoners and a massive cache of anti-tank mines, grenades, rockets and machine guns seized from the hideout

Team leader of the feasibility study Minoru Shibuya presented the report to Communications Minister Nazmul Huda at a function at the Shetu Bhaban.

Iraq draft resolution sees no pivotal UN role

Plan stresses US firm control

Trying to win over skeptics, the Bush administration revised a UN resolution that emphasises an eventual transfer of power to Iragis but still leaves the US-led coalition in firm control

The new draft, obtained by Reuters on Wednesday, gives the United Nations a list of duties, similar to earlier versions. But it falls short of demands by France, Russia, Germany and others that the world body play a pivotal, independent role in overseeing the country's transition.

Diplomats expect considerable suggestions for changes before the measure is adopted by the 15-

member Security Council. At minimum, they say, the draft should set a date for when a plan leading to Iragi

sovereignty could be submitted. The main purpose of the new resolution, as before, is to transform the military operation into a UNauthorised multinational force under American command.

This provision is aimed at attracting more contributions from nations wary of sending soldiers as part of an occupation force, although volunteers appear to be scarce.

The 25-member Iraqi Governing Council, appointed by the United States, would provide a timetable and program for drafting a new constitution and for elections, in cooperation with the occupation

3 US troops die as violence rages in Iraq

Three US troops were killed in a span of hours as the Americans pressed their drive to root out the Iraqi resistance to their nearly sixmonth-old occupation, taking the toll from attacks to 88 in five months.

One soldier was killed late Wednesday in a rocket-propelled grenade (RPG) attack in Samarra 100 km north of Baghdad, at the same time as another was struck down by small arms fire in the capital.

The pair of attacks came just four hours after a bomb claimed the life of a soldier in Tikrit, the hometown of ousted strongman Saddam Hussein.

"A 4th Infantry Division soldier died of wounds he received in an RPG attack on his convoy which

was travelling by Samarra," at nine pm (1700 GMT), a military spokesperson said.

The infantryman was evacuated from Samarra to a field hospital where he later died, the spokesperson added.

It was the 88th death of a soldier in combat here since US President George W. Bush declared hostilities over on May 1. As the convoy was being

ambushed in Samarra, unknown assailants shot dead a US soldier and wounded another in the capital.

The two members of the 1st Armored Division, were shot with a small-calibre handgun also at nine pm while on patrol in the posh Al Mansur neighbourhood in Baghdad, the US military's Central
